REFEREE ISBISTER RESIGNS BUT STAYS

Rugby Official Objects to Criticism in McGill Daily—McGill Apologizes.

Montreal, Nov. 12.—Bob Isbister, of Hamilton, former star of the Tiger rugby squad and more recently the senior referee in the Intercollegiate Rugby Union, yesterday morning tendered his resignation as an official. However, after talking matters over with representatives of the McGill Rugby Football Club and a member of the Canadian Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union, Isbister decided to withdraw his resignation and will officiate in the McGill-Varsity game, the final college tussle of the season, scheduled for Toronto Saturday. Statements to this effect were made yesterday by Major Stuart Forbes, graduate manager of athletics at McGill.

Isbister's action followed the publication in a local afternoon paper of an extract from the McGill Daily in which Isbister's work as referee in the McGill-Varsity game here last Saturday was bluntly criticized. At a meeting of the Athletic Board of McGill yesterday morning the board went on record as officially disapproving of the reference made in the McGill Daily's story of the game to Isbister's work. A written apology from those responsible for the criticism of the official will be sent to Referee Isbister.

Further, on their own initiative, Captain Philpott, on behalf of the McGill senior rugby players has expressed in no uncertain terms the disapproval with which the players regard such criticism of officials. The leader of the McGill squad points out that, while in the course of a game as in his privilege, he has had occasion at times to question rulings by the officials, but at no time have the players wished to protest any rulings by Referee Isbister and have been satisfied to abide by his decisions. They, through the captain, have gone on record as being wholly opposed to criticism of this kind at any time as being entirely against the principles and spirit of the Intercollegiate Rugby Union teams.

SHAG DEFENDS HIS CONFERENCE STYLE

McGill Team Get Their Plays Away Faster Than the Others.

Montreal, Nov. 12.—Frank Shaughnessy, generally averse to entering into controversial affairs concerning rugby, has come out flat-footed in defence of his conference plays, following criticism of the "huddle" system used by McGill as expressed by Toronto rugby critics. The Toronto Globe characterized the conference system of calling signals, as used by McGill in the last two intercollegiate games, as slow and bound to prove unpopular. Shaughnessy yesterday pointed out that a check had been made by timekeepers of the conferences as used by McGill, both in practices through the week and in the games and stated that, while the conferences might at first appear to the spectators as slow, yet in actual time McGill were getting the ball into play within ten seconds on many occasions; twelve seconds on an average and fourteen seconds as the slowest time to get moving. He adds that this season McGill has not had a down call against them for failure to get the ball in motion within the required time limit of twenty seconds, and that both "Varsity and Queen's," who use the ordinary method of calling signals, have been penalized for infringing on the 20-second rule.

It is further pointed out by the McGill coach that, aside from a certain amount of deception which can be provided this way, the conference play has the advantage of relieving the players of the task of learning an involved system of signals. All they are required to learn under the "huddle" system is four or so formations and from the conference is to go. Outside of lessening the task for the players it has, he claims, this advantage, which is rigidly important at McGill. It reduces football to what is taught on the field. There is no long black-board sessions necessary for signal purposes and leaves the players free in the evening to pursue their studies, football being confined to the two hours each afternoon that the men put in on the field.
