TELLS ABOUT HIS ESCAPE FROM PRISON

(Continued from Page 1.) "All this time we were in prison clothes. How we got other clothes was like this: Two kids who were out shooting came along and asked us if we were bums. We said yes and asked for something to eat and for clothes. One of them said: 'I'll get all you want, my old man is a section boss and I can get the keys to the section house. They did so, and we took caps, sweaters and everything we needed. When we left them we promised to write to them.

How Gang Separated. "We waited for a freight, and then walked 20 miles. Then we argued what we should do, and decided to split up. Bryant struck out with me for Trenton, Ontario, and Ryan and Brown went together. We got as far as Kingston and Montreal and then Bryant and I separated.

"I worked my way over the border to Vermont, then to Boston, where I got a job, and I stayed in Connecticut, in one town or another. I worked for the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and got my transportation paid to Derby. I was in a section gang there for eight months. In Bridgeport I worked on a church and on the Stratford hotel. I came down to New Jersey because I wanted to ship to 'Frisco, but I couldn't ship there so shipped to Germany."

He said he had lived in Germany under the name of Hall. He came back to the United States on the S.S. America, on which he had shipped as a seaman. He paid one dollar for another seaman's papers and came over on them.

He was headed for 270 West 25th street, New York City, where he had lived for two weeks before he went to Germany. As he stepped off the train at the New York end of the Hudson river, in 30 Church street, Detectives Kalbfleisch, Fay, Sullivan and Klerman, of the New York police and Detective O'Keefe of the Pinkerton Agency, closed in on him.

To Bring Simpson Back. Toronto, Nov. 23.—Proceedings will be started at once to bring back Gordon Simpson, 26-year-old Toronto man, arrested in New York and wanted here on a charge of robbing the Bank of Nova Scotia, Oakwood and St. Clair branch on September 27, 1923, and stealing \$3,066 while armed, and for escaping from Portmouth penitentiary, where he was serving a five-year term.

The attorney-general's department was asked by the Toronto authorities to ask for Simpson's extradition and it was announced that the provincial authorities have wired the British consul in New York to communicate with the New York department to hold Simpson. It is stated counsel will be appointed in New York to represent the British government, to go before the United States courts and apply for Simpson's extradition.

It is stated that any person arrested in the city of New York cannot be extradited without application even if the accused waives his right to fight extradition. This complicated law only applies to the city of New York.

Another course could be taken by the police to request the immigration department to deport Simpson as an undesirable citizen.

The Following Article Appeared in the Buffalo Evening News of November 17th, 1925:

Users of Anthracite Substitutes in Buffalo are expressing considerable surprise over unexpected ease with which they have been able to make the shift from one kind of fuel to another. Also most of them are finding that they actually like Coke.

"My house has been more comfortable since I have changed from anthracite to coke than it was when I was burning hard coal," said one new-fuel adventurer. "It is particularly noticeable in the matter of getting the house warmed up in the morning. Under the old fuel very little change could be felt in the house for an hour after the drafts were turned on in the morning. Now we are breakfasting in a comfortable temperature in about that time."

"My ash barrels are a revelation to me of the amount of waste I was paying for in the hard coal, so called, I used to burn," said another new coke user. "At this time of the year I had to burn a can and a half of ashes each week—and they were heavy at that. In the real cold weather I would have two and a half each week, sometimes three."

"So far this season I have had only about one can full of ashes in seven days—and they are materially lighter, can for can. In bulk I am getting about two-thirds as much ash as I did when I was burning anthracite and, while I have not weighed them, I figured I am only getting about half as much in weight."
