TWELVE CANADIANS EMPLOYED AT GENEVA

Winnipeg Man Latest Appointee to International Labor Office.

London, Nov. 24.—The appointment of Graham Spry, an Oxford graduate from Winnipeg, to a position in the Public Attorney's Department of the International Labor Office, brings the total of Canadians connected with the League and Labor Bureau to at least twelve.

Two Canadians have been in the League since its inception, the most prominent being Sir Herbert Ames. Mr. Spry is the third Canadian to receive an appointment with the League in the past two months.

With her unusually large proportion of nationals serving the League, with Senator Raoul Dandurand as president of the Assembly, Canada has played an exceedingly important part in the organization in the past year. The Dominion is also the only member of the British Commonwealth, except Ireland, which has a permanent representative stationed at Geneva to act as accredited envoy.

CANADA TO BE REPRESENTED.

At the International Agricultural Show in Chicago.

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—The International Live Stock Exposition and Hay and Grain Show opens at Chicago soon Saturday, November 28th, the farmers of Canada will be very largely represented in competition with the best that exhibitors from the United States can produce. Last year Canadian exhibitors swept the boards in the Hay and Grain Show and also won some of the most coveted blue ribbons for horses, cattle and sheep. The most outstanding victory won by Canada last year was when J. C. Mitchell of Dahnada, Saskatchewan, won the world's wheat prize, making the third time he had scored this honor and the thirteenth time that Canada had won it in the fourteen years the competition has been held. Mitchell's prize bushel of Marquis wheat was the best in over 600 displays from all parts of the United States and Canada. It is competing this year and has hopes of winning again.

H. H. the Prince of Wales is entering his famous Shorthorn bull "King of the Fairies," which was a championship winner at this year's Royal Winter Fair in Toronto. This bull, which is being sent from the Prince's Ranch near High River, Alberta, won a fourth at Chicago last year. It has won championships in the most important live stock shows in Western Canada and has been awarded a gold medal by the British Shorthorn Breeders' Association.

At last year's International Show Canadian grains and seeds captured 128 prizes including the world's championship for wheat, and the highest awards for alfalfa seed, flax, flint corn, and field peas, 25 out of the 30 premiums for hard spring wheat and 24 out of 30 in oats.

As in other years one of the attractions at the show will be the Canadian Government exhibit showing the great variety of products of the farms and orchards in all parts of Canada and indicating the opportunities the Dominion offers to settlers on its fertile lands. 240,000-000 acres of which still await settlement.

The International show is held from November 28th to December 8th, inclusive.

Hon. T. A. Crerar was re-elected president and general manager of the United Grain Growers, Limited, at the meeting of the directors.

The Following Article Appeared in the Buffalo Evening News of November 17th, 1925.

Users of Anthracite Substitutes in Buffalo are expressing considerable surprise over unexpected ease with which they have been able to make the shift from one kind of fuel to another. Also most of them are finding that they actually like Coke.

"My house has been more comfortable since I have changed from anthracite to coke than it was when I was burning hard coal," said one new-fuel adventurer. "It is particularly noticeable in the matter of getting the house warmed up in the morning. Under the old fuel very little change could be felt in the house for an hour after the drafts were turned on in the morning. Now we are breakfasting in a comfortable temperature in about that time."

"My ash barrels are a revelation to me of the amount of waste I was paying for in the hard coal, so called, I used to burn," said another new coke user. "At this time of the year I had at least a can and a half of ashes each week—and two were heavy at that. In the real cold weather I would have two and a half each week, sometimes three."

"So far this season I have had only about one can full of ashes in seven days—and they are materially lighter, can for can. In bulk I am getting about two-thirds as much ash as I did when I was burning anthracite and, while I have not weighed them, I figured I am only getting about half as much in weight."

These are just some simple expressions of opinion from a good many heard in regard to Coke.
