That now that the elections are over for the present we can talk of what women who have the franchises, for the federal, provincial and municipal elections, can do to use the power that has come into their hands of recent years, for the good of their country. No one wants to suggest that women are not quite as capable of exercising their franchise as wisely as men, but most men have been accustomed to discussing political subjects since they have reached their majority. Their friends have the same interests and questions of the day are spoken of at men's clubs and meetings and gradually a man forms his opinion on questions of the day. Now many women have missed all this. There are, of course, hundreds of women who are quite as well informed as their men folk, but there are thousands who are not. The questions are never discussed except at election time, and then with a certain amount of heat. The greatest good of the greatest number should be the desire at the root of our decision as to how to vote. But women should know conditions and not wait to learn about them from political speeches.
