WILLIAM KENNEDY NEW PRESIDENT

Elected to Head Central Ontario Baseball League for 1924.

William L. Kennedy of Kingston was elected president of the Central Ontario Amateur Baseball League at the annual meeting of the League held at Belleville on Wednesday. Mr. Kennedy has been actively engaged in baseball circles for a number of years, being the very efficient treasurer of the Kingston Baseball Club for a number of years. Mr. Kennedy is highly regarded in Central Ontario League circles and his election to the post was very popular. The other officers elected were as follows: First vice-president, T. H. McFadden, Peterboro; second vice-president, W. P. North, Belleville; secretary-treasurer, Newton Thompson, Belleville.

Past President Ernest Parsons and Secretary Newton were appointed delegates to the O.B.A.A. President Anderson presented the Johnson Cup, League pennant and Spalding medals to Manager Daly of the Kingston team, champions last year. In making the presentation, President Anderson remarked that he was sorry that the Kingston Club had not finished and brought the championship to the Central Ontario League but Manager Daly explained what had occurred during the Fall. It is yet unknown whether Ontario League next season and no communication was received from Oshawa but efforts will be made to learn what the Motor City people intend doing. Ottawa and Brockville are anxious to get into the Central Ontario League but Peterboro is strongly opposed to this.

Mr. Kennedy, in taking the chair, expressed thanks and pleasure at being at the league helm after three years' service in the league. He promised to do all he could in any way to continue the business of the league to its best interests.

Past President M. P. Duff moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Anderson, whom he said had been a most efficient president, and very popular with ball clubs. He had filled the office with credit to himself and Oshawa.

Secretary Thompson said that he had never been notified of the recommendation for suspension of Joe Daly, and B. Steacy, of the Kingston Club, by the O.B.A.A., as a result of the friction over the final series last Fall. Mr. Daly and others after reading the laws, stated that they did not believe it was constitutional to suspend them.

HEARD ON THE STREET

THE BOOTH FUNERAL MARKED BY SIMPLICITY

Body of the Canadian Lumber King Placed in Freshly Dug Grave.

Ottawa, Dec. 10.—Simplicity, that virtue exemplified so well by John R. Booth in life, governed every feature of the funeral arrangements and the burial of the ninety-eight-year-old lumber king here this afternoon. At Beechwood cemetery, where his body was interred to rest alongside that of his wife, who predeceased him about half a century ago, and other members of the family, there was no marble vault for the reception of the dust of one of Canada's greatest men. The body was lowered into a freshly dug grave in the Booth plot and the earth placed over it.

The funeral service was conducted at the residence of Mr. Booth at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon by Rev. Dr. W. T. Hertridge, pastor emeritus of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, and Rev. George D. Kilpatrick, assistant minister of Chalmers United Church. Then through the streets, lined with citizens and followed by a vast concourse of sorrowing friends, Mr. Booth was borne to his last resting place.

Twickenham, Eng., Dec. 10.—In the fifth annual rugby football game between England's two great universities, Cambridge defeated Oxford to-day 33 to 3. Of 43 previous contests Oxford had won twenty-three, and Cambridge seventeen, while nine were drawn.
