PETERS CASE BEING HEARD BEFORE JURY

(Continued from Page 1) men who was in the car. The girl's body was lying eight feet from the corner of the curb on Wellington street, and eight feet south of Place d'Armes. He measured on the night of the accident the exact position the body was in. He was the first person to reach the body. At 10.30 o'clock on the night of the accident he traced the tracks of the motor car. The brakes had been applied at the water fountain about sixty feet past the scene of the accident.

Standing on Corner. Ivey Roach, a friend of the late Florence Timms, was standing on the corner of Place d'Armes and Wellington street, when the accident happened. He was about eight feet from Florence Timms, when the latter was hit. Florence Timms was slowing down to get off the bicycle. The front right wheel, that is the one nearest the curb, passed over Florence Timms' head. The witness had been attracted to the car before the accident, by reason of the fast speed of the car. The horse and buggy were on Place d'Armes street, when the accident happened.

Cross-examined, the witness admitted that Florence Timms had said that she had not ridden a bicycle before the afternoon of the accident. The witness could not say whether or not Florence Timms let go the handle bars and fell off the bicycle.

Miss Marjorie Suds was on her way to a store on the west side of Wellington street. Miss Suds stopped and watched Florence Timms because Florence Timms was coming so fast and was holding. She was wobbling all over the road, but she did not fall off the bicycle. Nothing special attracted the witness' attention to the automobile.

"When I first saw her she was holding that she couldn't stop. She was talking to Ivey Roach I think."

"I didn't hear her scream, when the car was upon her." Before and after hitting the bicycle the car was going fast, said the witness.

Miss Suds said the horse and buggy was just coming round the corner, and in order to avoid hitting the horse and buggy, she turned to the left in front of the motor car, which was behind her. The witness said that she believed that if the horse and buggy had not been there that Florence Timms would not have turned to the left.

Car Had Speed. Mr. William Halliday said he was going north on Wellington street on the night of the accident. He was attracted to the car by its excessive speed. The car was going over twenty miles an hour.

Howard Dick, City Engineer, was called to give evidence as to certain measurements made at the scene of the accident. It is 145 feet from Place d'Armes to the C.N.R. freight shed and Wellington street is 36 feet wide, said the witness. Percy Weir, an eye witness of the accident, testified that his attention was attracted to Peter's car by the speed at which it was travelling. He thought it was going faster than twenty-five miles an hour. Weir said he thought that the automobile tried to go between the horse and buggy and the curb. If the automobile had continued on its way it would have hit the horse and buggy. The car swerved close to the curb and so struck the bicycle. The car slackened speed after the accident. The girl on the bicycle was riding slowly and was wobbling. Just before the accident, the girl turned her bicycle slightly to the left in front of the car.

THREE SMALL BOYS BURNED TO DEATH

In Fire Which Destroys Their Home—Their Father Severely Burned.

Montreal, Dec. 10.—Three small boys, John, Arthur and Eugene Currota, aged three, five and seven, children of Louis Currota, were burned to death late last night in a fire at Caughnawaga, while Hattie Currota, aged five, a fourth child, was saved by being dropped from a window. The father, Joseph Currota, and two other residents of the village, are in hospital suffering from severe burns. Meagre details that could be obtained were that the fire started from some unknown cause in the dwelling of Joseph Currota, and that the building, a wooden one, was quickly destroyed. Other members of the family were out at the time, but the children, aged three, five and seven respectively, were in the house. Mr. Currota's condition is reported as serious.

Given False Alarm. At midnight Wednesday the firemen received a call from Box 70, corner of Division and Union streets, but arriving there, found no cause for the alarm. The firemen received a call Thursday morning about 10.15 o'clock from 224 Johnson street, where a car had taken fire after back-firing. The blaze was soon extinguished without any damage to the car.

The First Stage From Kingston. On the 1st of January, 1816, the first stage between Montreal and Kingston was established by Barnabas Dickinson. Covered sleighs left Samuel Hedge's, in St. Paul street, Montreal, and Robert Walker's Hotel, Kingston, every Monday and Thursday, and arrived every Wednesday and Saturday. In January, 1817, Samuel Purdy established the first stage between Kingston and York (Toronto). It left Daniel Brown's inn, Kingston, every Monday morning, and York every Thursday morning, stopping at Spaulding's inn, Grafton, as a halfway house. The fare was \$15 with twenty-eight pounds of baggage allowed. The best winter Purdy reduced the fare to \$10, \$8 to Belleville, and \$6 to Spaulding's inn. On the opening of navigation the stages between Prescott and York were discontinued, as a steamboat was then on this route.
