




Preparations Are Made For the **Handling** of the Increased Business.

The Christmas rush is on in earnest at the post office, and preparations have already been made for handling the increased business. Postmaster James Stewart stated that the people have responded to the slogan, "mail early." He did

a rush as in former years. The in-

crease at present, is one quarter over the normal. This was unusual for this time of the year, which is very early for Christmas mailing. takes nineteen mail carriers, and parcel post carriers, with horses to handle the peak rush, which comes a few days before Christmas. Parcel post is already arriving for Christmas, and the volume is in creasing as the days go by. The staff of the local post office is not increased for the Christmas season. The sixty employees along with the six who are not taking holidays for this season of the year, will handle the increased work. Next week delivery on Saturday afternoon will be started. This will be carried on until after New Year's.
