GAVE ADDRESS ON 'THE NEGRO PROBLEM'

Prof. Clark, Head of English Department, Queen's University, at Rotary Club.

A very interesting address on 'The Negro Problem' was given at the Rotary Club luncheon on Friday, in the British-American hotel, by Prof. Clark, the new head of the English department, Queen's University. Prof. Clark spent a number of years in the south, and is especially well qualified to speak on this subject.

In opening his address, Prof. Clark stated that two things that impressed him when he came to Kingston, were the solidity of the buildings, and the absence of the negro from our streets. In speaking of the negro, he said that they were very fond of singing and the sadness of their songs was one of the outstanding features. He read some of the negro songs to illustrate this fact. The negroes were also very fond of jokes, and their nimble wit could be compared to the Irishman's.

Speaking of the more serious side of the situation, the speaker stated that whenever two races live in close proximity to each other, there was bound to be a racial strife. This has been illustrated in other cases. At present there are eleven or twelve million negroes in the United States. By 1960, there will be twenty million. This is a phase of the situation that the American Government did not seem to consider. In some sections of the United States, the negroes outnumbered the white men ten to one. Especially was this true in the southern states. A large number have migrated north. This has caused an economic danger in some of our northern cities, where large numbers gather in our large centres and cannot find employment. The standard of living of the negro is lower than ours and this caused dangerous friction between the two races. When this occurs, spasmodic race riots have broken out and a mad fury seizes the black race.

'What is going to become of the negro in the United States?' asked the speaker. He had studied the problem for years, and had come to

Alexandra Ruled None As Well as Herself

'Saxon and Norman and Dane are we, But all of us Danes in our welcome to thee.

Alexandra! So wrote Tennyson, greeting Alexandra to England over 60 years ago. Alexandra came and charmed. Most beautiful and tactful of princesses, she filled for a long generation the difficult role of taking first place in all the feminine activities of royalty without seeming to usurp first place in rank.

Then a too-brief reign on the throne, at the most gracious period of British social leadership. Then the partial eclipse of a not always contented retirement, with the role of Lady Bountiful in an age that decreasingly honored charity. Finally a quick and easy death, in the ripeness of age, after a career at the summit of the social institution of royalty. It should have been a happy life.

The probabilities are, on the contrary, that it was a very heavy one. To be gracious through youth and maturity, and again through old age, to two exacting queens, and to be lenient and loyal to an always charming but sometimes erratic husband, and all in the white light that makes the occupancy of a throne a task of continuous play-acting, was a difficult enough domestic situation.

To have an active brain, at the very centre of public affairs, through two critical generations, and yet to take no part in them, was a discipline of self-repression. And then, in old age, to see her royal relatives on other thrones deposed and assassinated and the whole institution of world royalty crumble, was to mingle personal and family tragedy in the wreck of nations.

So the last of the grand dames maintained her imperial pose to the end, and went to her death unbending, with the heartaches of 86 years sealed in her casket of pride; a queen whose most sternly-ruled subject was herself.
