Prescott, Dec. 12.—The river canals close for the year today, and shipping activities on the St. Lawrence River will cease for this season at the end of the week. The steamer Lake Fond Du Lac, owned by Henry Ford, passed through the canals en route from New York to Detroit. The steamers Maple Hill, bound for Kingston, and the John Gehm en route to Buffalo, were the last up-bound boats. The Maple Hill was the last down-bound boat.
