## CITY LEAGUERS PLAY TO-NIGHT

### Queen's and Regiopolis Meet in Senior and Olympics and Vic-Boo-Hoos in Junior.

Tonight the opening games of the Kingston Hockey League will get under way with Victoria-BooHoos, the amalgamated junior aggregation, stepping up against the Olympics in the opening junior clash at 7:15 o'clock while the seniors will open up right after, Queen's and Regiopolis being the attraction. The two games promise to be thrillers and unbounded interest has been shown by the teams. The Olympics and Vic-BooHoos are keen rivals and should provide as neat a junior battle as would be wanted. There is some splendid material in the two teams and fans who pass up this game will be missing a treat.

Queen's will trot out a snappy aggregation against the Regiopolis Club tonight and they expect, not only to win tonight but to walk through the City League series. The Tricolor may have some trouble doing this for the Regiopolites and the other teams are no mean aggregations and should be able to step all the way with the thrice-striped speed artists.

Games on Wednesday, Regiopolis and Queen's juniors will provide the excitement in the opening encounter of the City League on Wednesday night and the Live Wires and R.C.A. will appear for the first time this season. The Live Wires' management has been scouring the city for good material and has been successful in landing some high steppers. The R.C.A. too have had some fast hockey players transferred here this year and besides this, they go outside of their own artillery brigade to strengthen up the red and blue team and they should be able to make a much better showing in the City League series than they have thus far.

The City League is co-operating with Queen's and the Kingston intermediate O.H.A. club in every way that it possibly can and it is up to those two to assist the League in any way possible and it is to be hoped that they will.

## REGINA JUNIORS MADE STRONG BID

### Nosed Out by Two Points in Dominion Final at Montreal.

Montreal, December 14.—The junior rugby championship team of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, who only last Saturday annexed the Eastern Canada championship, gained further honors here Saturday afternoon by winning the Dominion championship by defeating the Regina Patricia's, Western Canada titleholders, by a score of 6 points to 4. The locals trailed the west representatives throughout the game, taking the lead ten minutes from the end of the final quarter, when Potter, star middle-winger, went over the line for a touch, which was not converted.

This scoring play sent the M.A.A.A. team into a two-point lead, which they managed to hold, despite a strong finish by the western champions. Regina gained their points through a field goal and a rouge.

Although defeated the western squad played a real hard and brilliant game, as did the winners, and they go back west to Regina beaten but not disgraced. The game was

anybody's, and Montreal can be congratulated on their win, which marked the first time in the history of junior rugby that east and west have played for Dominion honors.

Helen Willis, Tennis Star, Leaving For France.

Berkeley, Cal., Dec. 14.—Scholastic demands on a junior at the University of California do not allow much time for athletics, but anyone who wishes to meet Helen Willis, national women's tennis champion, will find her in top form.

"I'm awfully busy with my studies, but manage to play tennis five or six times a week," Miss Willis told the United Press.

"That's about the extent of my sports. I like golf, but have little time for it. Tennis keeps me busy every hour I can get away from my books. Being a junior has its re-

sponsibilities and the school work is not as easy as it was."

Miss Willis, accompanied by her mother, will leave here the latter part of the month for France, where she will spend the winter. The American women's champion is anxious to meet Suzanne Lenglen, world's titleholder.

### MAY STAGE FIGHT.

Dempsey's Attorney Arranging for Tussle in July.

Kansas City, Kan., Dec. 14.—The proposed heavyweight championship match between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, negro, will "in all likelihood" be held near Chicago some time in July, Ray Cannon, attorney for Dempsey, declared here.

Cannon said Floyd Fitzsimmons probably would be the promoter. He met Fitzsimmons in Chicago, Cannon said, and Fitzsimmons showed him a tentative contract prepared by a Chicago syndicate, with the financial terms substantially the same as those contained in the South Bend contract with Fitzsimmons which has been invalidated because the South

Bend syndicate could not post the required forfeit.

Cannon said that while the contract offered by the Chicago syndicate was not acceptable in its present terms, it might be ironed out so as to become acceptable. He indicated the chief difficulty was in the matter of payment.

All concerned seemed to think it would be preferable to hold the bout in July rather than in September, Cannon said.

This, of course, should be barred by the two coaches in attendance before somebody gets hurt and put out for the season. The Kingston intermediate team will play Queen's practice game this week.

The new grouping which adds Cobourg, Trenton and Port Hope to this section is going to be a heavy group financially. The jumps to and from Kingston and Belleville to Cornwall are bad enough, but when Cobourg and Port Hope have to be run in, it's getting pretty steep. It does not seem as though this arrangement will meet with any favors around this part of the country. As it is, Kingston and Belleville have far enough to go to Cornwall and the same goes for Cornwall to come here and go to Belleville.

The Frontenac regiment team held a workout at the Arena on Saturday night and there was a big list of candidates on hand for places on the team. The Regiment team plays its first game against Queen's next Friday night in the City League series.

Tommy Kirby, who is now located in Napanee, was in the city over the week-end and seemed quite anxious to be back in Kingston this winter again. Kirby, one of the speediest junior centre players ever turned out of Kingston, would have made a good man for the intermediate team.

Carl Voss is showing great improvement over his hockey of last season and should go big with the Tricolor seniors on the defence this season. Boucher is going strong as ever also, while Ewart Lindsay continues to show the boys how it's done.



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## Nothing Like This In Canadian Game

The Devon rugby committee recently had a merry meeting at Newton Abbot, England, in dealing with the many complaints against players. Suspension followed suspension, with the idea that such penalties would serve to bring about cleaner play on the field.

The referee in charge of a game between Falmouth and Plymouth Albion reported that F. W. Sanders of Plymouth Albion retaliated after being kicked by Jackett of Falmouth, and the committee suspended Sanders for a month. Seven forwards of the Torquay Reserves were suspended for fourteen days for using uncouth language in the match with the South Wales Borderers, and the captain of the Torquay Reserves was suspended for a month.

Mole of Newton Abbot, a county forward, was dropped for a month for striking an opponent in the match against Camborne. For a similar offense in the match against Colloompton, W. Upcott of the Exmouth Reserves, who had been suspended previously, was banned indefinitely. Another forward, who

was suspended until the end of the season. For deliberately kicking and tripping an opponent in the match against Buckfastleigh, R. Nicks of Totnes was suspended until January 1st.

For disputing a referee's decision Mortimer of Sidmouth was suspended. For a similar offense and ungentlemanly behavior, Hodges of Totnes also was suspended and for striking an opponent in the game

against Kingskerswell, Field of Teignmouth was suspended. It was decided to warn Teignmouth that if any further report should be received as to the misconduct of spectators its grounds would be closed.
