FOREST FIRE LOSSES

Of Ontario Diminished to the Lowest Record.

Toronto, Dec. 28 .- Latest statistics, just released by Hon. James Lyons, Minister of Lands and Forests in the Ontario Government, indicate that Ontario has at last mastered that spectre of Northern Ontario timber limits—the forest fire. In almost jubilant tones, Mr. Lyons declared that Ontario's forest fire loss in the past year had totalled only 10,154 acres of timber. 
