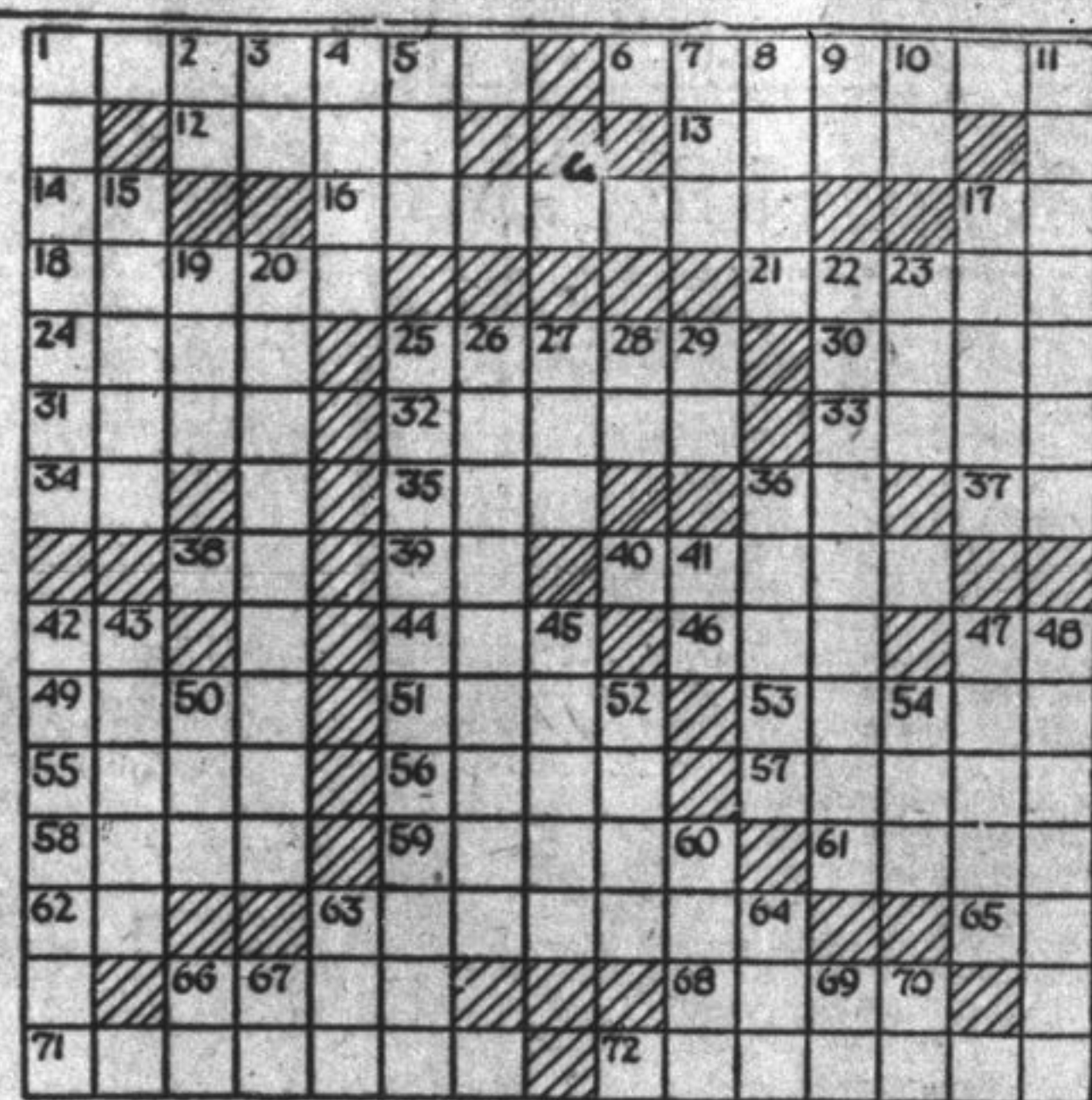

**Kingston Township Affairs.**  
 Sir: In giving judgment in the recent Kingston township shortage case, Judge Lavell denounced the lax administration of "incompetent administrators." I fancy by his remarks that if opportunity presented, and some of these men stood facing him in the prisoner's box, they would receive a reprimand that they would have cause to remember and which would be perfectly justifiable considering the incompetence displayed by men in whom the electors placed their confidence to safeguard the moneys collected by taxation, to defray the liabilities of the municipality.

It was a strange thing for a collector to hand over \$2,000 of the public moneys to any party, without safeguarding himself and his bondsmen by obtaining a receipt for the same. I have on a number of occasions been entrusted with the collection of tax rates, and have always been able to give an account of every dollar and would have been held responsible if I had not done so, and any collector, no matter who he may be, is responsible for every dollar entered on his tax roll, unless he can show just cause why he should not be. He is the man who is appointed to handle the moneys and safeguard himself, when he hands amounts
