



Canadians of the West to keep up the struggle for their racial rights. "The reception that is being accorded to the pilgrims from Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba in the "fair province" could not be more cordial. It is a real family festival. "Our compatriots of the West are struggling valiantly to obtain the recognition there of all the rights that they possessed in the Province of Quebec. They wish to speak and to teach their language freely, to have Catholic bilinguial schools such as those which exist on the banks of the St. Lawrence, and to practice their religion as they wish. In Alberta and Saskatchewan they have already obtained more liberty than their brothers in Ontario."

The main grievance of French-Canadians in other provinces are those connected with separate denominational schools and the teaching of the French tongue. So far as the practice of their religion and the use of their own language are concerned, we do not know that there is room for serious complaint.

ON CHARGE OF THEFT.

Youth Accused of Stealing Coat and

Sum of Money. Roy Howards, a young man in his early twenties, who was arrested on Christmas Day, at McDonald's Corners, near Mississippi, by Officer Tomlinson of Sharbot Lake, charged with the theft of a mackinaw coat and \$48 in cash from a resident of Oso, was brought before Judge Lavell on Thursday morning to elect trial. Howards chose to be tried before Judge Lavell and the trial was set for Wednesday, January 13th, 9.30 a.m.


