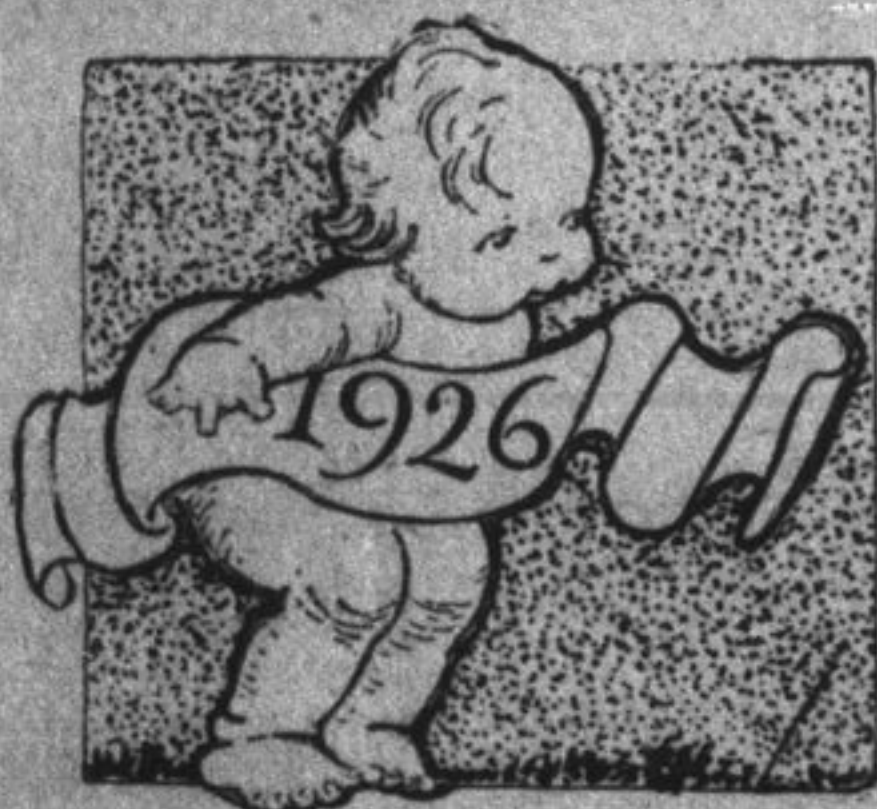

Must Have License to Fish.
The days of tax-free fishing in New York state are virtually over. On January 1st the new law requiring residents as well as non-residents to have a license to take fish with a hook and line becomes effective. Only "minors" under sixteen, women and landlords and their families fishing on their own property are exempt under the statute; everybody else who casts a line in waters of the state must have a license, which, however, will be a combination permit covering hunting and trapping as well.

A Sermon on Cheerfulness.
Rev. Dr. W. T. G. Brown preached on "Good Cheer" in Sydenham Street Church on Sunday morning, as a desirable thing to be exercised throughout the coming year. Automobile Licenses.
Harry Bould, the local automobile license issuer, has just received 500 of 3,500 licenses to be sold in Kingston. The remainder of the markers are expected to arrive during the latter part of the week. The markers were due to arrive here on December 15th, and automobile owners were to have until January 1st to procure them. Reports were recently received from Toronto to the effect that no days of grace would be allowed, but no official statement has been issued by the department, and it was also stated that automobile owners would not have until March 1st to obtain their licenses as formerly. The seeming inconsistency of the action of the department was due to the delay in the manufacturing of the licenses. No doubt the day of grace will be left at the old date.

Birth of Local Government.
W. S. Herrington, Napanee, writes to the Toronto Globe, I observe in your editorials under the heading "Voting to Help Ourselves," the statement that Adolphustown was the birthplace of our present system of municipal government. I have in my possession the original minute book of the first town meetings held in the township of Adolphustown. For a great many years it was believed that the system did take its rise in the township of Adolphustown. I am sending you under separate cover a paper presented by me to the Royal Society of Canada in 1919, from which you will observe that these meetings in the Township of Sydney were first inaugurated in 1790.
