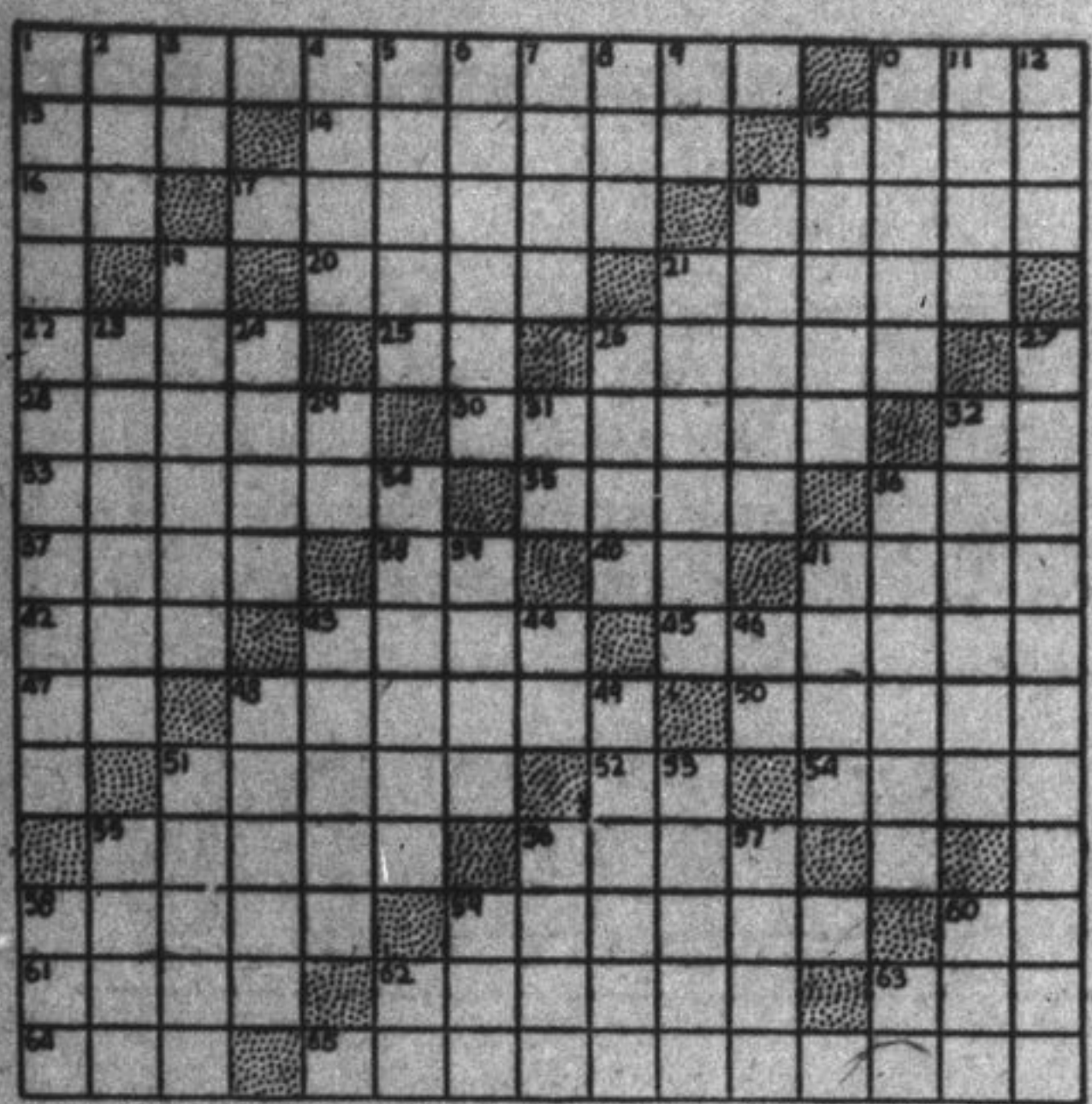


CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

With New Heart and New Hope Canada Sets her Course Toward the Goal of True Greatness

THE Dominion of Canada passes the first quarter of the Twentieth Century with Faith and Resolution perched high upon her banners. Canada occupies second place among the world's exporters on a per capita basis, and holds fourth place among the world's greatest traders in foreign markets. Canada, during a period of twenty-one years, has increased exports from 200 million to more than one billion dollars; her total world trade has advanced from 400 million to one billion 900 million.

—as an Agricultural Nation

Canada has one million workers engaged in agriculture, working only one-fifth of her arable land; these workers produced revenue from the soil amounting to one billion 420 million dollars annually. The total agricultural investment is approximately seven billions. Dairy products yield over 250 million dollars annually; live stock revenue averages over 140 million dollars; 644 crops yield more than 900 million dollars annually. Canada in 25 years has increased the acreage under cultivation from slightly less than 20 million acres to nearly 60 million.

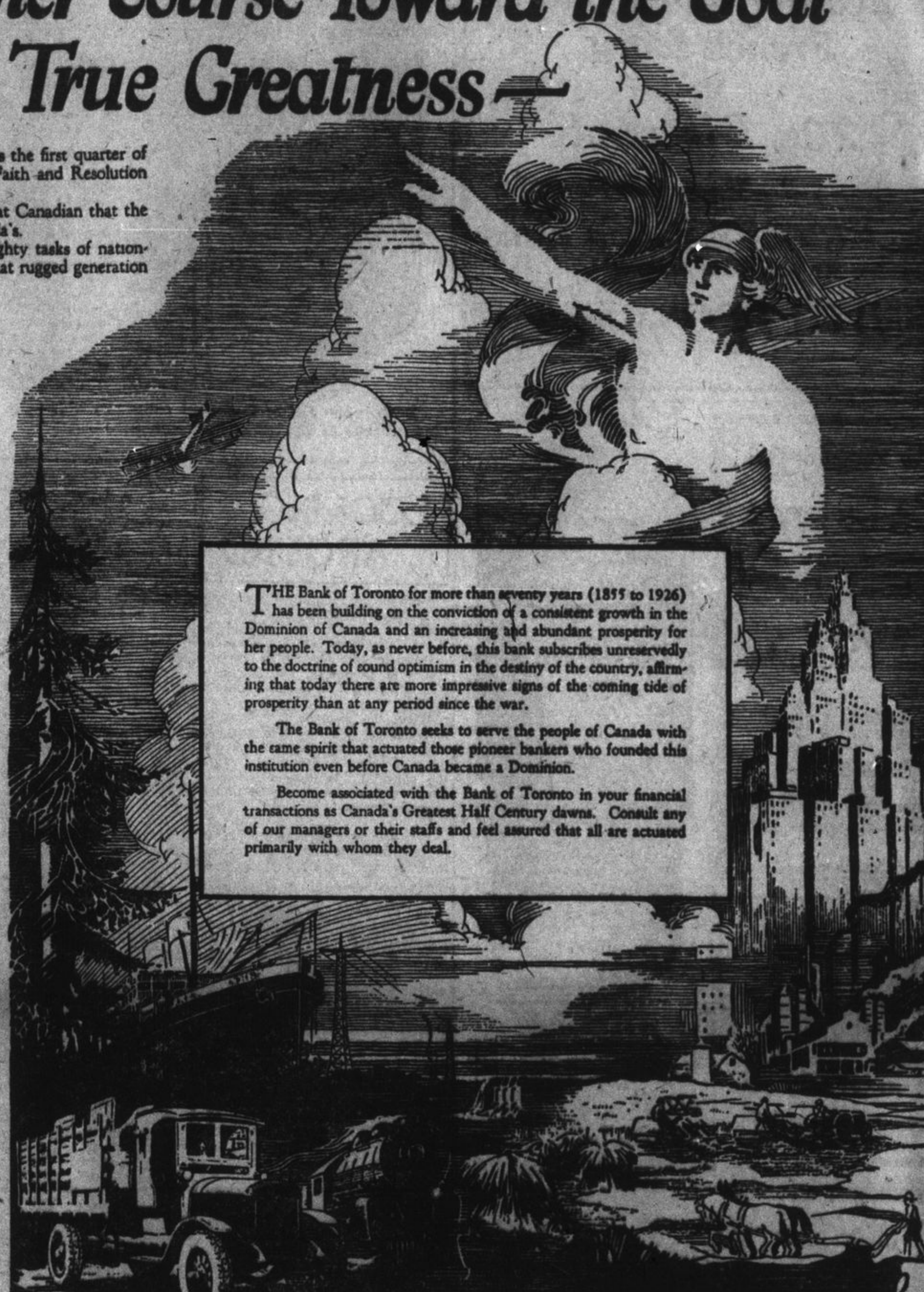
—as a Manufacturing Nation

Canada employs approximately 700,000 people in industrial and manufacturing pursuits, with a return of 4 billion dollars annually. Canada's total investment in manufacturing amounts to approximately 1 billion 200 million dollars. Canada's manufactured and semi-manufactured products represent more than 15 per cent of her export trade. Canada in a twenty-year period has increased the production of manufactured goods from 480 million to more than 4 billion dollars.

—in the World of Finance

Canada increased her National Debt seven-fold and enlisted one-thirtieth of her 1914 population in the fight to maintain world civilization, yet today her per capita debt is less than that of any of her allies, except the United States, which was in the world war but one year and a half. Canada's own citizens hold eighty per cent of the bonds representing Canada's indebtedness. Canada's population of nine millions has more than two billion dollars on deposit. Her people have invested in the last ten years more than 1 billion dollars in bonds. Canada has attracted, in the last quarter century, more than 4 billion 200 million dollars of British and United States capital.

What a panorama of past achievement, of present opportunity and future greatness must pass before the eyes of all those Canadians possessed of the spirit that cries "Ever Onward!" The New Dawn has come for Canada in the first quarter of this most eventful of all centuries. Every true Canadian should greet it as the Omen of a Greater Canada and a Greater Canadianism.
