### QUEEN'S RESPONSIBLE FOR CANADA'S VICTORY

Canadian Colleges Win Five Out of Eight Hockey Games in New York.

New York, Jan. 7 .- The eightgame intercollegiate hockey series between teams from Canada and United States, sponsored by Tex Rickard in his new Madison Square Garden, was concluded last night with the final count standing: Canada 5, United States 3. The flashy sextet of Queen's University brought victory to the Canadian side of the border when it registered its second win of the series by defeating Princeton 4 to 0. The total attendance at the eight college games was in the vicinity of 40,000.




