#### OBITUARY

**The Late John Smeaton.**  
John Smeaton, of Victoria street, one of the best known, most active and beloved members of the Masonic Order in Kingston, passed away Friday evening, at the age of eighty-one, following a short illness.

The late John Smeaton held almost every office in the fraternal order, of which he was such a devoted member, including that of past grand steward of the Grand Lodge of Canada. For over half a century he was a member of Cataragui lodge and was known in Masonic circles throughout the district.

The late Mr. Smeaton was a past master of Cataragui lodge; honorary life member of The Ancient St. John's lodge, Minden lodge, Queen's lodge, Royal Edward lodge, member Ancient Frontenac and Cataragui Chapter, member of The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. He was also a member of the Board of Governors state, of the General Hospital, and a staunch member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church.

The deceased was known as a man of sterling parts, always ready to assist any worthy cause for the betterment of the community, and willing to give freely of his time and talents. As a young man he taught school for a time, and later was engaged in business, but for many years he has been retired. Although he was blessed with years beyond the ordinary allotted span of life, yet his passing will be felt deeply by a very large number of friends, and the tenderest sympathy will be extended to his bereaved family.

The deceased is survived by two brothers: Thomas, of Kingston, and William, of Ann Arbor, Michigan; one sister, Mrs. James McIntosh, of New York; one daughter, Mrs. W. R. Miller, of Kingston; and one son, Frank, also of this city.

The funeral will be held under Masonic auspices from the Masonic Temple on Monday afternoon at two o'clock. The remains will be taken to the Temple on Sunday and lie in state.
