Township Councils

KINGSTON.

Cataract, Jan. 4.—The first meeting of the council for 1926 met to-day at 11 a.m. The oath of office of each member was shown as signed in the proper time. All members were present when the roll was called. On motion of Weller-Hawkey, the minutes of the last meeting of the council of 1925 were adopted as read.

Communications re bill of damages claimed by Mr. Cramer resulting from an accident, which occurred north of the village of Cataract on the Sydenham road. No consideration given as the road is a county road. Petition re sewer on Victoria street north was read. Names submitted being H. Curson, Mildred Curson, William James Baker, Ellen Baker, Frances Baker, Joseph Hawkey, Thomas Fossie, Edna Fossie, Robert Holzgrove, Emily Holzgrove, Frederick Martin, Emily Martin, John Ladds, F. W. Smith. This to be installed on the local improvement plan.

Motion, Weller-Hawkey, that the reeve and deputy reeve be a committee to arrange for a sewer on Victoria street north.

Motion, Weller-R. Aylesworth, that men who apply for charity, be employed to cut brush or other work for the township. Motion, R. Aylesworth-Hawkey, that in the case of dependents, any person receiving charity will not be allowed by this council over fifty dollars per year; if the above amount is not satisfactory to the parties keeping the dependents, it will be necessary to have them placed in the Home for the Aged. Motion, W. Aylesworth-Weller, that this council adjourn until 1.30 p.m.

Council resumed at 1.30 p.m. Motion, Weller-R. Aylesworth, that the question of purchasing road machinery be taken up at the next meeting. Motion, Hawkey-R. Aylesworth, that W. J. Smyth's account re charity (Miss Rose) be paid. Motion, Weller-W. R. Aylesworth, that the copy of the Voters' List for 1926 be placed before the council for correction, if any is required, before being placed into the hands of the printer. Motion, Weller-Hawkey, that Mr. Smyth be paid \$40 as salary for services as school attendance officer. Motion, Weller-R. Aylesworth, that the caretaker order two cords of wood for hall.

Motion, Weller-Hawkey, that the clerk write up in order, the births, marriages and deaths that have not been copied for nine years, and also sort the township papers and place the important ones on file or in vault, and that he shall be paid for this service. Motion, Hawkey-Weller, that John Gibson be appointed member for the local board of health. Motion, Weller-R. Aylesworth, that B. Harpell be appointed sanitary inspector for 1926. Motion, W. R. Aylesworth-Weller, that E. J. 12 re appointing of member of local board of health and sanitary inspector have its first reading. Motion, W. R. Aylesworth-Weller, that by-law 192 be read the second and third time and be signed by the reeve.

Motion, Weller-W. R. Aylesworth, that Byron Gerton be appointed auditor at a salary of \$75 per year, to audit the books for the year 1925. Motion, Hawkey-Weller, that L. Trudell be appointed trustee officer for 1926 at a salary of \$40 per year. Motion, Weller-Hawkey, that A. E. Saunders be appointed road overseer at a salary of \$2.50 per day. Motion, Hawkey-R. Aylesworth, that Thomas Purdy be appointed constable for the township at an un-stated salary.

Motion, Weller-Hawkey, that the road overseer look over the road complained of by Mr. Simpson in the 7th concession. Motion, Weller-W. R. Aylesworth, that all bills marked OK by members of council be paid during 1926.

The following bills were ordered paid: \$5, Earl Fraser, drawing title; \$9.74, Scott and Duberry, charity; \$10, William Beare, work on road; \$44, Herman Emmons, work on road; \$5, B. Tolle, charity; \$8, Joseph Wise, 200 stamps for use of clerk; \$5.25, D. Hartman, work on road; \$20, Municipal World, supplies for clerk; \$2, George Compton, work on road; \$14.75, Jacob MacRoe, planks for bridge.
