The question was raised as to the defense urged by some of the American "amateur" hockey players, who were really nothing more than professionals, that, under the rules of the O.H.A., they might still be considered amateurs. I replied that I was not familiar with these rules, but that I felt sure that the rules of the O. H. A. must be substantially the same as the amateur rules of all countries affiliated with the Amateur International Federation, and that I hoped, with the development of a new crop of amateur hockey players in this country, there would be no such humiliating spectacle as having a member of the American Olympic team admit that he had been paid

for playing hockey. "You probably heard of the unfortunate hockey situation in this country which resulted in the breaking away from the U.S..H.A. of the clubs in New York and New England and the formation of the Eastern Amateur Hockey League. You also probably know that the U.S.A. H.A. agreed at the Pittsburg convention of the A.A.U. to drop the word "Amateur" from its name.

No Reflection on Canada. 'Anything I said in the way of lines are only thirty-six feet from the end of the rink, instead of being playing at Verona. The following is criticism was directed at amateur hockey in the United States, and I surely had absolutely no intention of reflecting in any way on Canadian amateur hockey, and I am sure that my remarks could not be understood as being such a reflection in any way, as you know I have the greatest admiration not only for the Canadian athletics, but for the manner in which amateur athletics in Canada are conducted, and I cannot say too strongly that I made no aspersion on the amateur status of the Cauadian Glympic Hockey Team of 1924, or of any other Canadian bockey players."


