That Toronto has two companies of Sea Guides and the Navy League has assured them of its interest and co-operation. Halifax and Vancouver both have their Sea Guides. Col. Williams, in an address given at Bishop Strachan School on Saturday, spoke of the hardship of seafaring life. Every night in the year an average of six seamen perish on the Atlantic. The Sea Guides will assist in the work of the Navy League, that of caring for the dependents of seamen and as helping the sailors in many ways.

THE KINGSTON RED CROSS SOCIETY

It is always of interest to know what the Red Cross Society is doing, and therefore the attendance of members at the annual meeting held on Monday afternoon at the Y.W.C. A. was a representative one. Rev. T. W. Savary was in the chair, and Mrs. A. E. Ross, the president, was also present. Mrs. H. W. L. Day, the secretary, read the report of the year's work, which showed much activity on the part of the committees. Miss Isabel Ross was convener of the visiting committee and as her report shows, was most faithful and energetic. The society allows \$30 a month for the patients of the Hotel Dieu and General Hospital, and the visiting has been done by Mrs. W. A. Dewey, Mrs. H. F. Geary, and Miss I. Ross. The sum of \$50 is the allotment for Mowat Hospital, and the visitors are Mrs. W. A. Rogers, Mrs. Henry Dyckman and Miss Kathleen Daly. The visiting committee deserves great credit for their unselfish effort to give comfort to the patients at the three hospitals, who number about 125, of whom 100 are at the Mowat Sanatorium. Weekly and sometimes special visits are made. Clothing, fruit, flowers, etc., have been given by the citizens, which were much appreciated. During the year, a number of calls for help were received and responded to after a thorough investigation of the cases. A family in the city was provided with a stove and three month's rent was paid and a needy family in the country was assisted. These are only two of the many cases looked after by the Red Cross.

nine men and twelve women are being treated for tuberculosis, is visited, and the patients are assisted in various ways. The victrola was mended and needles were supplied, and one man was fitted out entirely by the Red Cross. The citizens responded splendidly to the request of the committee for cars, in which the patients were taken for drives and to picnics. Five picnics were arranged, one of them being the sail down the St. Lawrence to the island below Gananoque for the patients of the Mowat with their wives and families, arranged by Mr. J. M. Campbell. The tea was partly provided by the Red Cross.

In February, Miss Wilkinson of the Nursing service asked the Kingston Red Cross to provide either kitchen or linen equipment for an out-patient hospital. Linen was decided on, and a shower held at the home of Mrs. G. Y. Chown, one of the vice-presidents. The response was good, and the additional articles needed, purchased and sent to Whitney, Ont. In December, \$200 was voted for Christmas boxes for the other patients in local hospital. The sum of \$100 was spent on other boxes, and letters of thanks were received from Northern Ontario where the boxes arrived in time for Christmas. Mrs. Dewey and Mrs. Rogers are the buying committee, and it is due to the care and the generosity of the merchants that so much was purchased for the money. Eleven families in the city were sent dinners.

A grant of \$15,000 was received this year from the Provincial Headquarters for work among soldiers. The Red Cross Society has this year taken out a corporate membership in the League of Nations. Miss Winnifred Burns, the treasurer, read her report. Total receipts for the year were \$3,017.52; disbursements \$2,031.95; balance, \$1,025.57. All but \$50 of the disbursements was spent in Kingston. The visiting committee receives \$30 per month for patients in the hospitals. Nearly \$350 was spent on Christmas boxes for patients.

Miss Isabel Ross read the report of the visiting committee, showing one of the most interesting side of the work of the Red Cross in peace time. Almost everything one can think of is given to the patients, tobacco, sweets, fruit clothing and comforts. The Mowat Hospital, where eighty-
