KINGSTON DEFEATED LAST NIGHT BY TRENTON INTERMEDIATES 3-2

Last Period Rally Again Failed to Win for Kingston Squad—Local Team Lost Chance After Chance for Goals—Bohan, Trenton Goalie, Big Stumbling Block—Locals Off in Their Shooting—Kingston Now in Last Place.

In a fast, clean game of hockey that was featured by close checking and back-checking, the boys of the Kingston City went down to a 3-2 defeat at the hands of the Trenton Intermediates last night. The game was played in the arena at Trenton with Harold Mitchell, of Toronto, in charge. Kingston opened the scoring in the first period when Legon passed out from a scrimmage in front of the Trenton nets to Bellinger who netted for the first goal. Schenzel evened the score when he scored Brooks with a shot from a close range near the Kingston goal.

Kingston then carried the play to Trenton territory where it remained until Anderson the local defence man made one of his corker rushes down the ice to outguess Brooks for Trenton's second score of the evening. Bernard missed several chances through being over-anxious while Kingston kept peppering the enemy goal but could not sink the old guttural hero home.

Second Period.

The second stanza opened with both goalies being called into action. Soon after the start Smith missed a scientific opportunity to tally by shooting wide on an open net. Both teams were back-checking with great speed. When a Schenzel-Wells

combination failed, Smith grabbed the disc and single-handed out-guessed the whole Trenton team to tie up the score. Both goalies were forced to extend themselves after this but Anderson again put his team in the lead with a corner shot which Brooks did not even touch.

The third frame opened with Kingston trailing on the short end of a three-two score. The period was featured by fast clever playing on the part of both teams. Kingston took long chances in an effort to win what proved to be a lost cause and at times Brooks was left all by his lonesome. In the home territory only the clever work of Bowen in goal saved the Trenton team from defeat. There was but one penalty all night, that being to Bellinger of Kingston. To-day was the last day for the three County Hockey League players to decide their fate for the present season. Two of these, William Haggerty and James Neddow, were to decide whether they would play for Sunbury or Battersea in the junior series, while George "Paddy" Patterson, was to decide whether he would play junior O.H.A. or senior County League.

The Kingston juniors have the jump on the Brockville juniors by winning their first game away from home. It is hoped that the juniors can keep up their good work and come through in the series with the Island City.

AMERICAN REQUESTS ARE STILL HELD UP

Not Yet Decided if Big American Cities Can Enter National Hockey League Series.

Montreal, Jan. 12.—Following a special meeting of the National Hockey League executive here President Frank Calder announced that the applications for franchise from New York, Jersey City, Detroit and Chicago had been held over for further consideration.

The player limit clause was left as at present, each club being allowed twelve players under contract and two on the reserve list.

Play-off arrangements were clarified. Three teams will enter the rank to combat for the title and the right to compete for the Stanley Cup. The first team will draw a bye, and the second and third teams will play a home-and-home series, total goals to count, for the right to meet the leader in the final championship games. In event of a tie for place the two deadlocked teams would play a sudden-death game for the right to earn a bye.

Should there be a tie between two teams for second place, the usual two-game series for the right to meet the leaders would be conducted. In case three teams are tied for second place, there would be a toss of a coin for home games and sudden-death tilts to eliminate one of the contending clubs. The two others would then proceed with the play-off series to meet the leaders in the final.

THINGS TO REMEMBER

Lou Marsh says: Any player may stop a flying puck with his hands, but any player except the goalkeeper who reaches down to the ice and stops it, or who picks it from the ice, or shoves it along the ice with his hand for the purpose of stopping a shot on goal or preventing an opponent playing it may be penalized—in fact, he should be penalized.

The only player who is allowed to lie, sit, kneel or slide along the ice for the purpose of stopping the puck is the goalkeeper.

Defending players, other than the goalkeeper, who drop down on the ice during a scrimmage around the nets, or who throw themselves down during a face-off close to the nets, are

committing fouls and are quite properly penalized.

Amateur players who body check each other on face-offs are subject to a penalty. They are supposed to play the puck; not the man.

A player checking another who has the puck has the right to bear down on his opponent's stick with his stick or to lift it off the ice so that he cannot play the puck, but he must not touch his opponent's stick with his hands.

There is a penalty for teams which exceed the time limit between periods.

The only difference between a bodycheck and a charge is speed and intent.

Players who charge or body check the goalkeeper in his nets deliberately, or who even crash into him accidentally, commit fouls, are subject to penalty.

A cross-check does not necessarily have to be face high to draw a penalty. A cross-check across the arms does not look harmful, but it does a lot of damage sometimes.

A player who holds the puck against the footboards with his feet or stick may be penalized.

HOLWAY RELEASED

Changes Made in Personnel of Toronto Pro. Team.

Toronto, Jan. 12.—The personnel of St. Patrick's squad was changed somewhat on Saturday when Francis "Dutch" Cain was signed. Cain was let out by the Montreal Maroons, who failed to go through the formality of asking for waivers, and the Irish snapped him up in no time. He only arrived in Toronto on Saturday morning, but turned in a very useful game against Boston, giving McCaffrey and Corbeau much needed rests. Following the game Reg Reid and Toots Holway were given their releases by the management. The signing of Cain left no place for Holway, while Reid failed to live up to expectations. Both players have been with the Irish for over a year.


Model Auto Camp.
