BUILDING LOCOMOTIVE FOR ALBERTA ROAD

Mr. Nathaniel Marshall of Alberta Government Railway Department Here.

The Canadian Locomotive Works has received another order from the Alberta Government's Department of Railways and Telegraphs, for a locomotive to be used on the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway, which is owned and operated by the Government of Alberta.

It has taken some time to gather together all the material to be used in the locomotive, but the last consignment has arrived at the local plant, and it is thought that more men will be taken on, now that all the material is here.

Mr. Marshall, who is here in the interests of the Alberta Government, has had twenty years' experience along this line, and has been on such missions on previous occasions for the Government.

SHAREHOLDERS MUST PAY DOUBLE LIABILITY

Decision of Master of Supreme Court Regarding the Home Bank.

Toronto, Jan. 14.—Shareholders of the Home Bank of Canada, which collapsed on August 17th, 1923, with liabilities amounting to \$10,000,000 must pay double liability on their shares if fully paid up and also contribute the balance unpaid as well as double liability, if not fully paid up, according to the judgment today of Charles Garrow, K.C., Master of the Supreme Court of Ontario, acting as official referee under the Winding-up Act.

This decision, which is given after hearing of the case extending over a period of two years, affects about 1,700 shareholders of the bank in various parts of Canada and elsewhere. The only exceptions to the master's ruling as to double liability, are certain stock subscribers who paid ten per cent of the stock price, but were allotted no stock and drew no dividends. The capital stock of the defunct bank was \$2,000,000, of which \$1,960,000 was reported as paid up.

It is expected that the master's decision will be appealed to a higher tribunal.

Tinsmith Falls Off Church Spire and Instantly Killed

Montreal, Jan. 11.—Falling 150 feet from the top of one of the spires of the Notre-Dame church, near Montreal, W. Mathieu, a tinsmith, aged thirty, of Montreal street, Montreal, was instantly killed. Mathieu was placed on a covering on the outside of the spire and it is thought he slipped.

EIGHTY-SEVEN MINERS DEAD IN BLAZING MINE

One Woman, With Two Babies, Sat All Night Waiting for Her Husband.

Wilburton, Okla., Jan. 14.—Eighty-seven miners lay dead in the blazing Deguan-McConnell mine here today while scores of rescue workers stood at the mouth of the shaft helpless in the face of the flames which broke out anew early this morning. Six bodies have been brought out, raising the death toll to 92. Mine officials last night abandoned all hope of finding any of the trapped miners alive.

Many relatives remained at the mouth of the mine throughout the night, huddled about scattered fires awaiting the recovery of bodies of loved ones. As the night wore on, almost a dead silence settled upon the group broken now and then by the cries of women. One young woman with sleeping baby on either knee, sat throughout most of the night. With no word, she kept her place on an old nail keg warming the children before one of the fires. Only with the approach of dawn and the announcement that no bodies were to be brought out immediately, did she end her watch.

Sheriff Thompson Dead. Port Arthur, Ont., Jan. 14.—Sheriff A. W. Thompson died yesterday of pneumonia after a short illness. He was seventy-five years of age.
