To Commence Ice Cutting.
The Kingston Ice Company, Limited, expects that if the cold weather continues, ice cutting will be commenced on Monday next. On Thursday morning a number of men employed by the company were busy getting things in readiness for the cutting operations. On Thursday morning the ice was reported to be eight and a half inches thick and of a very fine quality. The company expects to cut about 14,000 tons of ice, which will be stored in the three large ice houses. About fifty-five men will be required to do the work, which will take from one month to five weeks. In most cases the company's employees are expert ice cutters.
