**NO PANIC ENSUED AS HOSPITAL BURNED**  
Victoria Hospital, Renfrew, Swept by Fire—Patients All Safely Moved.  
Renfrew, Jan. 15.—Owing to the destruction by fire of the Victoria hospital yesterday morning, the Renfrew Hotel has been turned into a temporary hospital to accommodate the patients and the nursing staff. Of the eighteen adult patients, four had undergone major operations within the past forty-eight hours and were in a serious condition.  
There was no panic. The fire broke out in the roof and was first observed from outside. The alarm was immediately given and the nurses, assisted by volunteers, helped or carried out the patients.  
Half an hour after the fire was discovered the upper floors were gutted.  
The Victoria Hospital was erected in 1897 as an isolation hospital and was later turned into a general hospital. The building was insured at \$25,000. An agitation has been on foot for the past year to erect a new hospital, on the ground that the Victoria Hospital was too exposed to the wind.  
Fire Chief Alth is of opinion that the fire started as the result of sparks from a fuse, some of which he thinks fell on a shingled part of the roof.  
The contents of the building were removed to the nearby Armory, with the exception of a new X-ray apparatus. This was covered with tarpaulins, and the effect of the damage to it is not yet known. The equipment of the hospital was valued at \$25,000. The building was erected in 1900 at a cost of \$35,000. Replacement value is set at between \$50,000 and \$60,000.  
One patient suffered a serious relapse as a result of the hospital fire this morning. She was Miss Berlinguet, who had been a patient in the General Hospital, Montreal, but who was convalescent and moved to the Victoria, near her home. She suffered greatly from shock and her recovery has been seriously retarded.  
John McEachran, 96 years old, who is blind and bedridden, had to be carried downstairs when the fire broke out. Several maternity cases were in the hospital when the fire started. One mother of four days was able to walk downstairs with the aid of a nurse, but Mrs. D. McCormick, who had been allowed up for the first time, had to be carried downstairs owing to her weak condition.  
Most of the patients seemed to be perfectly calm as they were hurried from the burning building, and none of them gave the nurses any trouble. The work of removing the patients was directed by Miss McWatters, lady superintendent of the hospital.  
There was no elevator in the building, so many of the patients had to be carried down two flights of stairs. Fortunately, the fire had gained but little headway when noticed by an attendant. Accordingly, the patients, bundled in blankets, had time to be taken out.

**MODERN GIRL BETTER THAN HER GRANDMOTHER**  
According to Decision Given by the Girls at Queen's University.  
The modern girl is better than her grandmother, according to the verdict of a debate held before the Levena Society of Queen's University on Thursday afternoon.  
The meeting was held in the common room at Ban Righ Hall and the class of '27 entertained. The debate on the subject, "Resolved, that the girl of our grandmother's day was superior to the girl of to-day," was debated by the years '28 and '29, the affirmative being upheld by the first year girls and the negative argued by the graduating class. Miss Helen Anglin contributed a piano solo to the programme.

**Best Dwelling Types For Canadian Climate**  
In discussing the subject of "When You Plan and Build Your Own Home" in the January Canadian Homes and Gardens, the following interesting statements are made by the author:  
There are several particular classifications which have proved highly successful in Canada, however, and these it is possible to carry out in any of the three media suitable to this climate: namely, brick, stucco and stone, or combinations thereof.  
Of all the types which have lent themselves to construction in this country, perhaps that one which is designated as "Georgian" is the most completely successful. Its absence of encumbering detail, its importance in the avoidance of projections which trap snow and give lodgment to ice formations, recommend it particularly. It is in every sense a pure architecture, and one in which contrasting builders have less opportunity for "going wrong," because of its perfect simplicity. It also lends itself with equal facility to either brick or stucco treatment.  
Perhaps next in order of suitability to our climatic requirements in construction, is the Colonial—not the Dutch Colonial, but that which is usually recognized as the American Colonial type. It has much the same conformation, by the way, as the Georgian. Another excellent precedent for our purposes in Canada is the English half-timber house. The bungalow and Dutch Colonial dwellings are charming, and serve their special uses, but the Dutch Colonial, on account of the intricacy of the frame-work, required to reproduce its outline, is the most extensive type of construction as far as mere fabrication of shape is concerned.

**TOURIST ASSOCIATION TO BE FORMED HERE**  
It Will Do Much to Advertise Kingston and Draw Visitors.  
That a branch of the Tourists' Association of Ontario be formed in Kingston, was the decision reached by representatives of the Industries Committee of the City Council, the Rotary Club, the Kiwanis Club, the Retail Merchants' Association and the Automobile Club at a meeting held in the City Hall on Thursday evening. All improvements to the motor camp will be left to this branch of the Tourists' Association, which will be composed of representatives of the clubs which attended the Thursday night meeting. This action practically means that Kingston will have a community motor camp administered by all classes in the city and financed by the City Council.  
Dr. W. W. Saxe was the chairman of the meeting and he outlined briefly the work of the Tourists' Association. It was felt by those present that a branch in this city could do much to advertise the many happy historical features and scenic beauties of this section so as to attract a large volume of the tourist traffic. On the Kingston and District Branch of the Tourist Association of Ontario will also fall the work of providing proper accommodation.  
The clubs and associations, which are to appoint representatives to the new committee, will be advised immediately and a meeting will be called very shortly.
