and \$60,000. One patient suffered a serious relapse as a result of the hospital fire this morning. She was Miss Berlinquet, who had been a patient in the General Hospital, Montreal, but who was convelescent and moved to the Victoria, near her home. She suffered greatly from shock and her recovery has been seriously retarded.

John McEachran, 96 years old, who is blind and bedridden, had to be carried downstairs when the fire broke out. Several maternity cases were in the hospital when the fire started. One mother of four days was able to walk downstairs with the aid of a nurse, but Mrs. D. Mc-Cormick, who had been allowed for the first time, had to be carried downstairs owing to her weak con-

There are several particular classifications which have proved highly successful in Canada, however, and

It has much the san conformation, by the way, as the Georgian. Another excellent pre cedent for our purposes in Canada is the English half-timber house. The bungalow and Dutch Colonia dwellings are charming, and serve their special uses, but the Dutch Coonial, on account of the intricacy of the frame-work required to reproduce its outline, is the most exuensive type of construction as far as mere fabrication of shape is concerned.
