The European Type Light Car

"OVER ACROSS," gas costs three or four times what it does here and the folks there are not so "flush" as we are. This has resulted in the development in Britain and continental countries of cars weighing not much over 1,000 pounds, with very short wheel bases and narrow treads, powered with engines which seem tiny in comparison with the smallest ones in American cars.

Trying Them Out In The U. S. A.

It has been announced that cars of this general type are to be introduced into this country by one of the greatest of our motor car manufacturers and this is important news, as it is evidence of a desire to give us more economical motoring-lower first costs and greatly reduced maintenance expense.

Do You Remember Cyclecars?

Somewhat less than fifteen years ago, as many motorists will recall, a similar attempt was made to awaken the thrift sense in the American motoring public, by the introduction of the so-called cycle car, a design in some respects similar to the present European type. The cycle car did not take, but there are some reasons to believe that this promised small car may prove more popular. At least its debut will be watched with keenest interest.

More Favorable Conditions Now The present need of conserving parking space and of superior manuverability are in its favor and furthermore roads have improved since the cycle car debacle. These light cars will double present gaso-Hine mileage, but their users will not do all their driving "on high."


