





Butter Grades Lower. Complete figures just available for | 1924. Federal butter grading during the past year show that the percentage of specials and firsts, both of pasteurized and unpasteurized, is lower than in 1924. Graders passed upon 635,321 packages of pasteurized butter during the year against 467,-147 during 1924. The percentage of the percentage of specials.

Over 64,000 packages of pasteurized butter were graded in Ontario during the year, a rise of nearly 20,-000 from 1924. In the latter, however, \$3.2 per cent, graded first, while in 1925 only 69.7 per reached this grade.

Only 187,000 packages of pasteurized butter were nearly 100,000 fewer than in 1924. Here again the percentage of firsts has dropped from 68 per cent 64.7. Practically all the unpasteurized butter graded was produced in Quebec.

Over 300,000 more boxes of cheese were graded, bringing the total to nearly 1,900,000. Grades showed some improvement.



Has Simple Remedy. Coccidiosis, which has probably chicks than any other disease, can Chass be combatted by feeding powdered skim milk liberally during the first few weeks of the chick's life, ac cording to Dr. J. R. Beach, a Western U. S. poultry expert. This remedy he claims to be fully effect tive. He recommends that powdered skim milk should pose 40 per cent. of the mash for the first ten weeks, and from that tim it should be gradually reduced to 10 per cent. at three months o age. As chicks will reach brotle size two or three weeks earlier on the powdered milk ration than on ordinary diet, the plan is not so expensive as at first sight it appears.
