At a meeting of the Clayton Sportsmen's Association, held January 19th, the dates were set and plans made for the annual ice meet. The dates chosen were February 9th, 10th and 11th, three big days of horse racing. Seven hundred and fifty dollars, which exceeds all previous amounts in purses, will be given in prizes.

**Kingston Poultry Show.**  
The marketing of poultry portrayed in a film and in actual killing demonstrations will form the chief features of the exhibit which the Dominion Live Stock Branch will have at the Kingston Poultry Show, Jan. 26th, 27th and 28th, in the Island Market. A continuous film showing the various phases of finishing, killing and packing employed in large packing plants will be in operation throughout the show. Two killing demonstrations will be given each day, at three in the afternoon and eight in the evening. In addition to these two features there will be a candling booth in which demonstrations in the candling and grading of eggs will be given.
