THE LATE F. C. HEATH.

Funeral of a Veteran Merchant of Portland.

Portland, Jan. 22.—The funeral service of the late Mr. F. C. Heath was held at his late residence, Portland, on Wednesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. Rev. Mr. Keough officiated. Rev. J. Holt Murray, of Matland, an ex-pastor and friend assisted in the service. The spacious rooms and outside verandah were filled to their utmost capacity with the sorrowing friends of the community who had had business dealings with the deceased for the past forty years, and had come to pay their last tribute to one who was respected by all who came in contact with him. The many beautiful floral offerings which surrounded his casket bespoke in a small measure of the esteem in which he was held by all; many being sent by the former neighbors, summer visitors and firms with which he had dealt for so many years.

The late Mr. Heath had been in poor health for the past eighteen months having been stricken during the summer of 1924; but by the skillful aid of the medical and nursing profession together with his strong constitution had regained strength enough to be up and around his place of business, although taking no active part. Meeting and conversing with his old-time friends helped to prolong his days and enabled him to get a wonderful and brave fight for life until about ten days before his demise, when he apparently gave up hope and passed peacefully away on Monday morning.

The deceased will be greatly missed, not only by his family, but by the surrounding community in which he resided as well as the many people who annually visit the Rideau Lakes as his figure was a familiar landmark, and his warm handshake and pleasant smile upon their arrival was a welcome for everyone; also by the commercial travelling public who expressed themselves in these words "Order or no order it was a pleasure to meet him."

Mr. Heath was a Methodist in religion and in politics a Liberal, but never took an active part in political affairs, being a home man, although he was always ready and willing to uphold whatever was for the good of the community. Owing to his honest dealings, his generous heart and courteous manner to everyone, he had built up one of the largest country general stores operating in Leeds county.

Besides his sorrowing widow to mourn his loss are four daughters and two sons: Mrs. W. H. Pinkerton, Mrs. Charles Dowsett, Mrs. Renzo Myers, of Portland, and Mrs. G. A. Pinel, of Canfield; Stanley and Walter at home, also three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Chipman, Portland; Mrs. Russell Dowsett, Mrs. Charles White and Mr. George Heath, Kenora.

The honorary pallbearers were Messrs. W. E. Bolton, W. H. Bolton, E. Farnum, A. Gallagher, T. Henderson and Dr. Croeggan and the active pall bearers were his four sons-in-law, W. H. Pinkerton, Charles Dowsett, G. A. Pinel and Renzo Myers.
