That representatives of thirty-three women's organizations, both French and English, in Ottawa, and two Manitoba societies, at a meeting in Ottawa endorsed plans for a \$100,000 drive which is to be launched among the women of Ontario for the erection of a national memorial building in Ottawa in Canada's womanhood. Mrs. A. Gordon, the chairman, outlined the project and said that the government had promised to make up a fund of \$250,000, the proposed cost of the memorial, if the women themselves would raise \$100,000 of this amount.

That the real winter weather of the last few days has been enjoyed by those who have plenty of coal in their cellars but not quite so much by those who are trying to eke a small quantity and wondering where the next load will come from. But for the fortunate, and they are many, who enjoy the brisk frosty weather, the bright sunshine by day and the glorious moonlight at night. Sunday and Monday were ideal winter days.

That Mrs. P. Howard, Winnipeg, has the distinction of being the only surviving nurse who participated in the Riel Rebellion of 1885. She is over 60 years of age, and is one of Winnipeg's pioneer residents. Mrs. Howard is still an active member of the Ladies' auxiliary, Army and Navy Veterans, and was presented with a life membership of that organization recently.

That the Women's Press Club of the Dominion of Canada will hold their next triennial meeting in Toronto. The probable date for opening will be June 25. Members of the club from coast to coast will attend. This now widespread organization had its beginning in 1904 when the Canadian Pacific Railway took a party of newspaper and magazine writers to the World's Fair at St. Louis. In one of the cars of the train in which they travelled fourteen women took initial steps in the formation of a society in which they would have a common interest as press women. In 1906 the members met at Winnipeg where, additional members were recruited and a constitution drawn up by Miss G. G. Hill, now famous as the woman expert on Canada's crop and live

stock, was accepted. Meetings at first were annual but owing to distances triennial gatherings became most expedient. These have been held at Edmonton, Alta., Montreal, Toronto, Quebec and Vancouver, B. C. The membership three years ago was 286 and is probably much larger now. The club has a wide field and embraces in its ranks women novelists, poets, special writers, artists in black and white and publicity experts who were formerly on newspaper staffs. Haig of the Winnipeg Free Press, the corresponding secretary Miss May Clendenan of the Farmer's Advocate, London, Ont. Colonel George Ham, with continental fame as publicity representative of the G.P.R., is also an author and the staunch friend of the organization from the time of its inception to the present. He is the only male member of the club.

Not only did the other children acquire a taste for music, but their whole conduct and character seemed to change for the better. The girl was there two weeks, but her good influence will last for years to come.
