The speaker was introduced by the president of the Canadian Club, Ralph Cowie, who gave a brief synopsis of Mr. Woodsworth's career. Mr. Woodsworth then gave an interesting and instructive address on "New Problems for Canadians." He dealt with the future of this machine age, through the home, the family, art, religion and politics, and stressed the intimate connection of Canadians to all other nations and the impossibility of Canada living to herself alone.

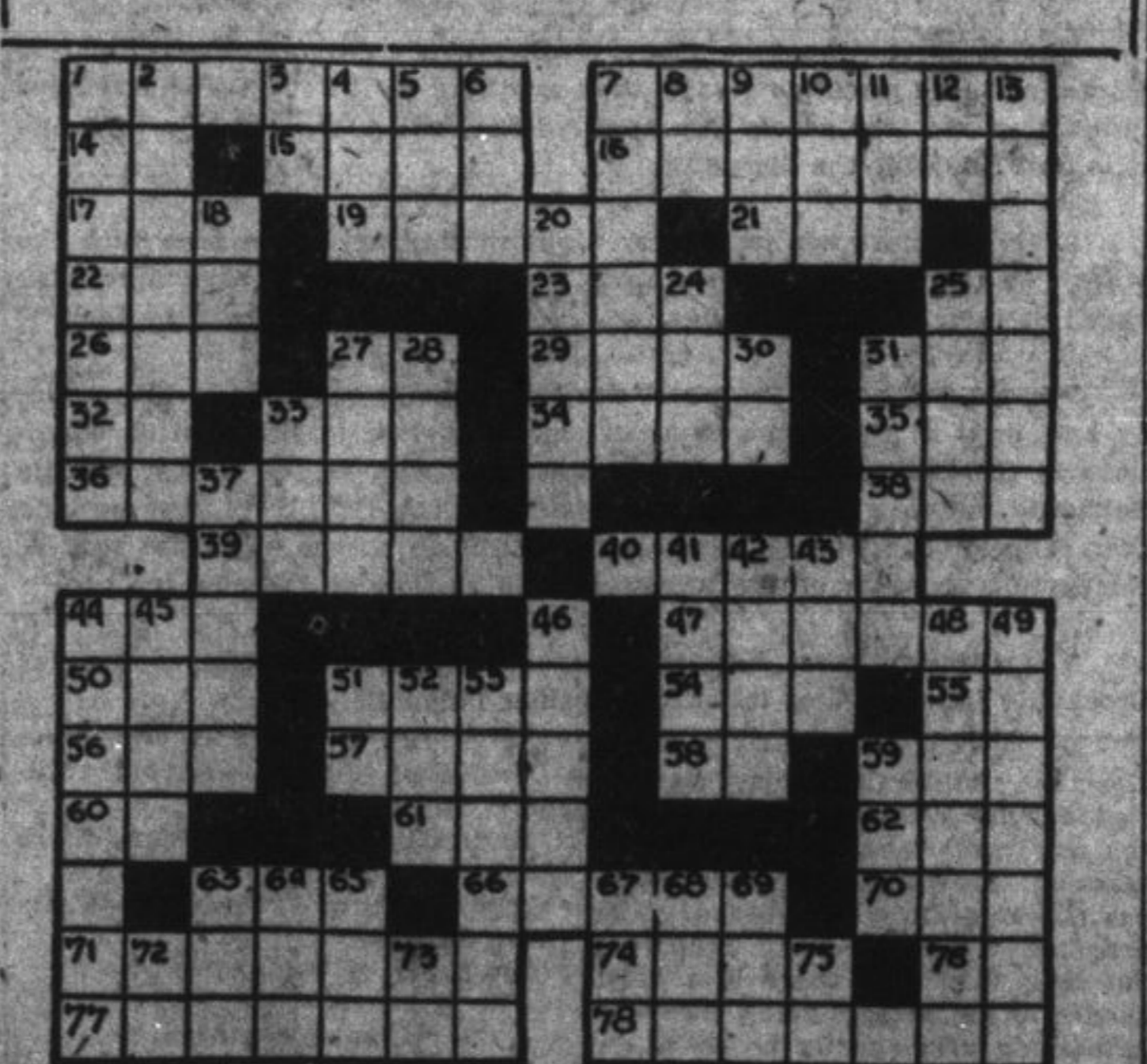
