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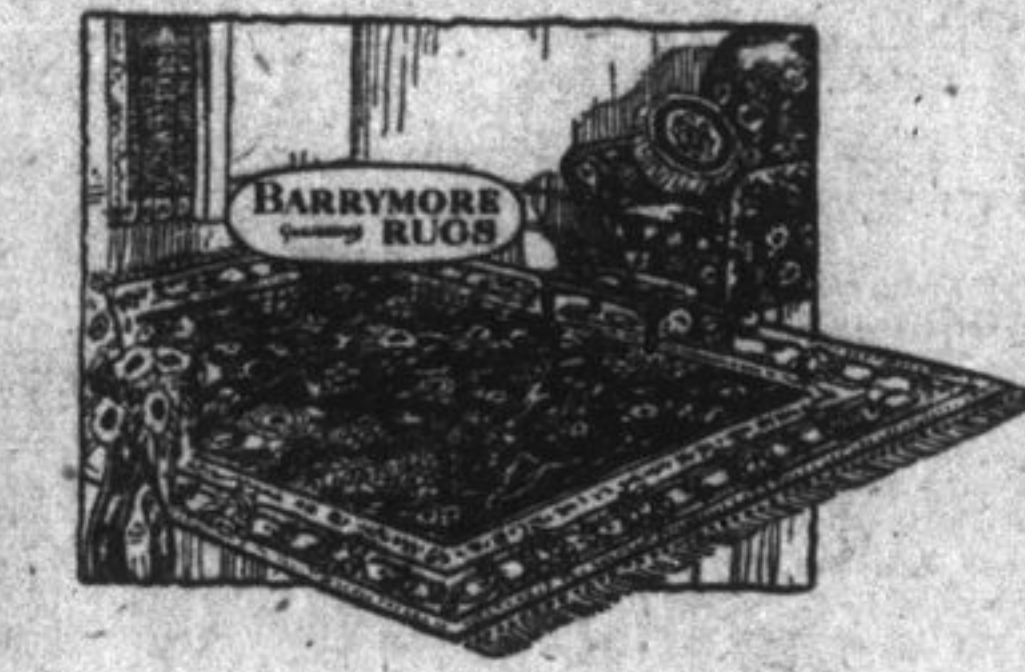
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A PROSPEROUS YEAR AT BETHEL CHURCH

Encouraging Reports Were Presented at Annual Meeting Wednesday Night.

On Wednesday evening, the annual meeting of Bethel Congregational Church was held, and reports were received from the officers and societies of the church, showing that it has been a very prosperous year, and much active work had been performed.

The meeting opened at 8 o'clock, by a devotional period conducted by the new pastor, Rev. W. H. Eber, sole. After the devotional period, the chair was taken by Mr. John Veale, president of the church, who carried on the business of the evening. The secretary reported a membership of sixty-six, no new members being added during the year, due largely to not having a permanent pastor, but with a new pastor many who are now ready to join the church will be received. No deaths were reported during the year, and three removals by letter were recorded.

The church treasurer, F. A. Hafner, reported the finances in good condition, with a balance in the general treasury of \$249.83, with all accounts paid, and the church free of debt. The total amount raised from all sources was \$3,244.65, of which \$13,815 was for missions.

Mr. William Bruce reported for the Sunday School a very active year in all departments, and the offerings amounting to \$248.70, of which they gave \$53.73 to missions. Miss Violet Lytle, secretary of the home department, reported fifty members enrolled.

The senior Christian Endeavor Society was a very active body during 1925, and did good work, under the leadership of Miss Isabel Veale, the president. The society raised \$356.09, of which they gave \$77 to missions and \$75 to the support of the church. They also support a boy and girl in Africa, and have taken services during the summer months at the Home for the Aged. The intermediate Christian Endeavor Society under the leadership of James Lomax, is progressing and the members very active in the work.

The Ladies' Aid and Missionary Society are a very aggressive body and a source of great help and comfort to the church. They reported having supplied the fuel for the church, and sent bales to Africa and the Labrador Mission, and Bibles were placed in hotels for the travelling public. The ladies gave \$112.62 to missions.

A resolution was passed expressing appreciation of the services rendered by W. M. Veale, former secretary of the church, who is now residing in Smith's Falls, and the secretary was instructed to forward him a copy of the same.

The ladies of the church served refreshments after the business was concluded, and a social hour was spent. The annual church supper will be held on Feb. 9th.
