NEWS OFF THE WIRES IN CONDENSED FORM

The third triennial national conference on education will be held in Montreal April 5th to 9th next.

Two fishing tugs, with eight men aboard, were caught in a terrific gale on Lake Michigan and dropped out of sight at 2 a.m.

The University of Lenoxville, Quebec, has asked for a Government grant of \$250,000 to carry out its \$750,000 programme.

The Conservatives are preparing to force a division on the amendment moved by Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, which is now before the Commons.

Hon. J. R. Cooke, Hydro commissioner, informed a deputation from the U.F.O. that he did not approve of a flat rate for Hydro throughout the province.

If the telephone rates in Ontario are granted the increase in Ontario and Quebec will be \$2,700,000 annually, of which Toronto will contribute \$500,000.

FIND STOLEN GOODS; FINE WORK BY POLICE

Three Young Men Plead Guilty to Series of Burglaries and Are Remanded.

When Police Constable William McKee captured two young men in a yard leading to a warehouse used by the Public Utilities, at 292 Ontario Street, about 11.30 o'clock on Tuesday night, he made a very important capture, as these two young men and another young man rounded up, pleaded guilty in Police Court on Thursday morning, to a series of burglaries around the city, and were remanded until Monday for sentence.

As a result of the arrests, the police recovered a pile of stolen goods. Places entered include the Collegiate Institute, where a number of valuable articles were taken; several boat-houses which were ransacked of valuables, while the two men rounded up on Tuesday night, by Constable McKee, admitted that they had attempted to break into the warehouse mentioned. It was a good piece of work on the part of Constable McKee, for a number of mysterious burglaries were thus closed up.

The owners of the booty secured by the police called at the police station Thursday morning, identified their property, and secured the same.

STRUCK BY STREET CAR.

Mrs. Thomas Reid Slightly Injured on Princess Street.

Mrs. Thomas Reid, Victoria street, was slightly injured on Thursday morning as a result of being struck by a street car. Mrs. Reid was crossing at Division and Princess streets and failed to hear the bell. She walked right into the car. Mrs. Reid is reported to be quite deaf and, therefore, unable to hear a car approaching. Fortunately, she was struck a glancing blow. One of her knees was bruised considerably. She was taken to the General Hospital, where Dr. Mylka was called in attendance.
