**Story on Japan.**  
Queen's University Missionary Association heard Mrs. H. F. Woodworth of Kobe, Japan, tell of some of the experiences of the missionaries in foreign countries, at their meeting held this afternoon. Mrs. Woodworth's address was illustrated with lantern slides.

**Case of Deserter.**  
A court-martial is being held at the R.C.H.A. barracks, for the hearing of a case of desertion, from one of the batteries, while they were in camp at Petawawa. The presiding officer is Major N. O. Carr, who will be assisted by various officers of the garrison. It is stated that the young man returned to his battery of his own free will.

**Laurier Club Address.**  
"Facism" was the subject of an address delivered before the Laurier Club of Queen's University, by Prof. H. R. MacCallum, on Wednesday evening, in the Douglas Library. Prof. MacCallum contrasted the Facist movement of to-day, which is working with and supporting the capitalists and manufacturers, and which is strongly anti-labor, with the out-and-out Socialistic policy of Mussolini in 1919. The strong personality of Mussolini was particularly stressed by the speaker. Mr. Ross Winter, the president of the club, presided and there was an excellent attendance.

**Lennox Agricultural Council.**  
The Advisory Agricultural Council for Lennox and Addington, composed of one farmer from each township, met in Napanee to review the work of the Agricultural Representative for the past year, and to make plans for further improvement in agricultural conditions. Subjects that came up for discussion included courses in agriculture, poultry, culling demonstrations, the alfalfa campaign, stock-judging competitions, plowing matches, weed control, live stock improvement, cow testing, T.B. test, county publicity, and an excursion to Kempsville and Ottawa.
