## DISTRIBUTION OF GAS AND WATER SERVICES

### Report Submitted to Utilities Commission—To Confer With Board of Works.

At a meeting of the Public Utilities Commission held on Monday afternoon, Manager C. C. Folger presented an extensive report on the distribution of gas and water mains and services, dealing with the programme as mapped out by the Board of Works and the City Council, for new pavements this year. Mr. Folger went into the matter in detail, giving an estimate of the cost of the work necessary on each street, and he was warmly complimented by the members of the Commission for his splendid report, which provided a great deal of interesting and valuable information.

In view of the heavy outlay on sewer removal and the large gas extension, Mr. Folger suggested that the work be divided into two parts, covering two years. The members of the Commission regarded the suggestion as a good one, and on motion of Mayor Angrove, it was decided to have the chairman and the manager wait on the Board of Works, and take up the matter with that body. The programme as outlined by the manager, will entail an expenditure estimated at \$12,000.

Mayor Angrove stated that the Board of Works had mapped out their programme, and that he felt sure the members would be glad to co-operate with the Commission in the work to be undertaken.

The Commission at the present time has some streets ready for work to be undertaken. This will provide work for the unemployed and on this account the members of the Commission are anxious to do as much as possible.

The list of streets as suggested by Manager Folger to be undertaken this year are as follows:

- Arch street, Union to Stuart street.
- Bagot street, Clarence to Johnston street.
- Brock street, Nelson to Victoria street.
- Centre street, Union to King street.
- Colborne street, Division to Chatham street.
- Charles street, Rideau to Patrick street.
- Deacon street, Barrie to Arch street.
- Earl street, Albert to Victoria street.
- Elm street, Division to Alfred street.
- Jenkins street, between Albert and Frontenac street.
- Livingston avenue, between King and Union street.
- Mack street, Alfred to Victoria street.
- Nelson street, between York and Princess street.
- O'Kill street, Barrie to King street.
- Pembroke street, Union to King street.
- Princess street, Alfred to City limits.
- Pine street, Division to Alfred street.
- Raglan Road, Montreal to Division street.

The resolution recently passed by the City Council, thanking the members of the Commission, for their hearty co-operation with the Council, in the matter of placing new lights was read, and ordered to be placed in the minutes.

The claim of Dr. A. W. Richardson, for injuries he sustained when he fell into an excavation on Clarence street, between Wellington and King street, was referred to the City Solicitor.

Commissioner Halliday referred to the new system for the chlorination of the water, and asked to have the manager submit a report on this treatment.

The manager was also instructed to call for tenders for gas and water pipes required in the proposed extensions.

The chairman, R. N. F. McFarlane, presided at the meeting, and also present were Mayor Angrove, James Harris and James Halliday.

## WILL CONFER WITH NUMBER OF BODIES

### Regarding Alterations to Fair Grounds—Meeting Arranged for February 11.

The proposed alterations at the Fair Grounds, making them into an amusement park, was the chief topic under discussion at the meeting of the Civic Property committee which was held on Monday afternoon. Various plans were presented by the aldermen in regard to cutting down the estimate of the city engineer, but no definite action was taken. It was decided to hold a joint meeting of the committee, along with the Kingston Baseball Club, the directors of the Kingston Industrial Exhibition, the directors of the Matinee Club and the Queen's Track Club on Thursday, the 11th, and present the matter to them and to get their assurance and support in regard to any improvements that may be undertaken by the committee.

## SAYS DENTAL SERVICE NOT A FAD OR FRILL

### Dr. F. C. Conboy Addressed Board of Education and Kingston Dental Association.

Dr. F. C. Conboy, Director of Dental Services, Department of Health, Toronto, who addressed the members of the Kiwanis Club at their noon-day luncheon on Monday, also addressed a combined meeting of the Board of Education, and the Kingston Dental Association, at a meeting held on Monday evening, in the Board of Education rooms, in which he made a strong plea for the establishment in this city of a dental service in the public schools. L. T. Best, chairman of the Board of Education, presided.

At the outset of his address, Dr. Conboy stated that he knew the members of the Board of Education desired to do the very best they could for the children, and he realized that taxes were high. A great deal was put forth, however, to provide training for the sound mind, while there was not the same effort to prepare the children for the development of the sound body. The best trained boy was the boy who was best prepared to take up his duties after he left school. It was the duty of the school to see that the bodies of the children developed so that they would be in a position to carry on their life's work with character and strength. The children should not be neglected physically. The establishment of a dental service would mean much to their physical development. The speaker spoke of the great need for the care of the mouth. We should be very careful about cleanliness. We were very careful about our food, yet we would allow food to pass through a filthy mouth, and this was detrimental to health; it could not be otherwise. It was most essential that this should receive careful attention.

Dr. Conboy stated that many diseases contracted by adults had their origin in childhood. Not one child in ten knew how to masticate his food. We should put first things first in connection with the care of our boys and girls. Children should be taught healthy habits. Money expended in this work would be well expended. If proper preventative methods were followed in every part of Ontario, we would immediately have a reduction of from ten to twenty per cent. in cases of casual illness.

"One objection raised to the dental service was that our fathers did not have this service, and they got along all right," added the speaker. "Some regard it as a fad or a frill. We must remember that our parents did the best they could for us. They were the people who made the real sacrifices. If they had the knowledge we have now, they would have been able to have made a still greater contribution."

The speaker stated that the matter was one that should concern every citizen. The expense incurred would be an investment which would bring handsome returns.

Dr. Conboy referred to other cities having a full time and half time of service, and in these places the people were well satisfied. In Toronto there was a system that was doing splendid service, and last year the mayor stated that he would not think of cutting it off. Under an act passed in July, 1924, the Board of Education had the power to establish a dental service. He declared it was not a fad or frill but something the city needed.

Following his address, Dr. Conboy answered many questions presented by the dentists in attendance, and also members of the Board, and there was quite a general discussion. On motion of Mrs. Revell, seconded by Mrs. Newlands, the speaker was tendered a hearty vote of thanks.

Dr. C. C. Nash told about the survey he made of the city a few years ago.

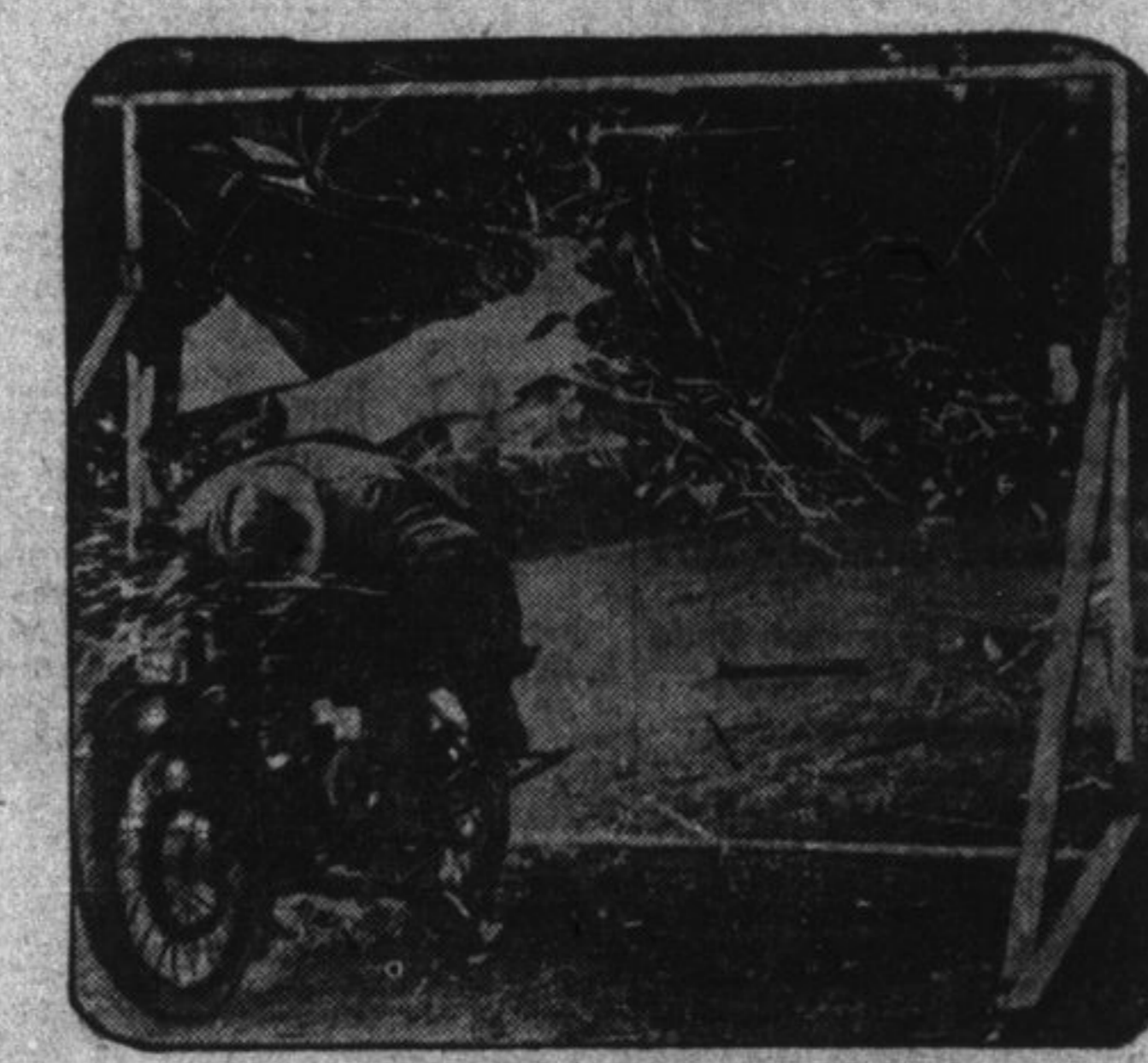

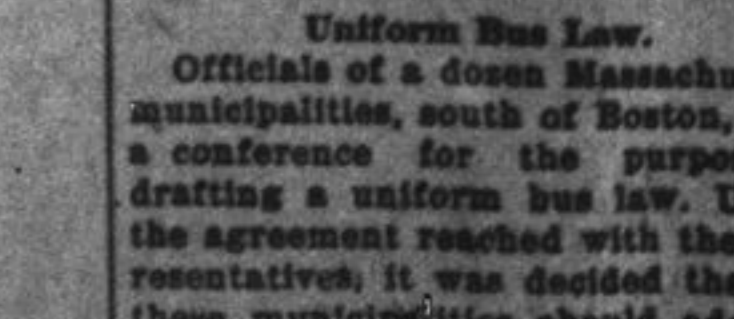
