

LET HORSES STARVE; TO SERVE JAIL TERM

Fined \$30 in Addition—Toronto Magistrate Denounces Cruelty to Animals.

Toronto, Feb. 5.—"There is one thing which all creatures understand and that is the language of loving kindness. Some of them have a greater comprehension of loving kindness than some human beings. You happen to be in that category."

In this scathing language and in tones of infinite disgust did Magistrate Brown address William D. Ross, owner of a riding school near the corner of Sheridan and Dundas, who admitted having ill-treated thirteen horses by failing to provide them with food, proper care and attention, as a result of which five of them died, while the others are being gradually nursed back to a healthy condition by the Humane Society.

"You will be fined \$20 and costs or 30 days and go to jail for seven days in addition," said the magistrate, after hearing Inspector D. R. Ballingal describe the deplorable condition in which he found the horses in the stable and telling of the constantly recurring complaints that had been received regarding the treatment they were receiving.

Youth's Life is Saved By Pair of Bootlaces

Perth, Feb. 5.—A pair of bootlaces saved the life of Sylvester McNamee, son of Mr. and Mrs. James McNamee, Stanleyville. While he was chopping wood in the bush on his father's farm the axe slipped, inflicting a deep wound in his left foot. Alone at the time, he was unable to move, but by means of the bootlaces made a tourniquet and stopped the dangerous flow of blood. In about two hours he was found by his father, who secured a sleigh and moved the young man to hospital. He is reported to be in a very weakened condition. Doctors say his presence of mind undoubtedly saved his life.

Death of Mrs. Emma K. Walker. The death occurred on Tuesday evening of Mrs. Emma K. Walker, widow of the late W. H. Walker, Belleville, in her eighty-third year. She was born in 1846. She had been a Belleville resident for over half a century. In religion, she was a Methodist. Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. George VanTassel, Belleville, and one son, W. H. Walker, Syracuse, N.Y.
