OSHAWA'S INDEBTEDNESS

The Oshawa Reformer states that the debenture debt of the city of Oshawa totals \$3,383,433, or \$211 per capita. The interest on that debt is doubtless at least five per cent. In other words, the average citizen of Oshawa is paying over ten dollars a year in interest on civic debt alone. That works out at upwards of \$40 per family. The per capita municipal levy for interest on indebtedness in Oshawa to-day is more than the school taxes eighteen years ago.
