QUEEN'S DEFEAT M'GILL BY 28-10

Speedy Work of Tricolor Completely Outclassed Red and White Basket Men Saturday.

Queen's senior Intercollegiate basketball team found little trouble in overcoming the McGill basketball team by the score of 28-10 on Saturday night before a large crowd of enthusiastic fans at the Queen's gymnasium. The half-time score was 16-4 for Queen's.

The visitors failed to show the dash and speed that they did against the University of Toronto in Montreal and it is hard to believe how the Red and White were able to overcome the U. of T. speedy outfit. Amaron scored the only field goal made by the visitors and the remainder of the eight points scored by McGill were on fouls.

The game did not come anywhere near providing the thrills that the Queen's-Varsity game did, when the Tricolor were unfortunate enough to lose out in the last two minutes of play after having held the upper hand right through the game. "Bud" Thomas appeared on the Tricolor lineup for the first time this season and proved to be a tower of strength as a defensive player but he had all kinds of hard luck on his shots, even in the practice before the game, causing much merriment among the fans when he repeatedly missed his mark.

It was a brilliant exhibition by Queen's and they had their combination down pat. They played a systematic game all the way through and had McGill baffled at every turn. Durham, Queen's speedy guard, was banished from the game in the second period when he made his fourth personal foul. Clarke, Sutton and Haslam were the big scorers for Queen's, those three getting twenty-four of the twenty-eight points scored by Queen's. Durham gathered in two points as did also Clary.

McGill failed to show a system to their play and many times they were caught unawares by the Queen's attackers. Queen's found many opportunities for easy baskets when the McGill guards were caught half-way down the floor. The speed and accuracy of the Tricolor passing was a treat to watch and they easily deserved the victory.
