SET ASIDE \$100,000 FOR STUDENTS' UNION

Meeting of Executive Committee of Queen's University Was Held Saturday.

At a meeting of the executive committee of Queen's University, held on Saturday, it was unanimously agreed, in view of the report received from the sub-committee appointed to consider the matter, that the sum of \$100,000 be set aside out of the proceeds of the Endowment Campaign for the purpose of aiding the erection of a Students' Union War Memorial.

Shortly after the close of the war a graduate vote decided that a Union would be the most suitable form in which the sacrifices of the University during the war could be commemorated. Following upon the vote, the student body for several years has been canvassed by support of this object and there is now on hand a considerable sum of money contributed solely by the undergraduates.

The trustees believe that this grant of \$100,000 ensuring as it does the erection of the Union in the near future, will free the minds of the students from any anxiety as to the prosecution of the Union scheme, and will secure their enthusiastic co-operation in the general endowment campaign.

John Lett Has Started On His Six Year Term.

John Lett, who made a sensational escape from custody in Kingston on Nov. 12th and who was recently arrested in Windsor, Ont., has arrived at the penitentiary. Lett was brought down by a penitentiary guard, and arrived at Kingston Junction at noon on Sunday, and was immediately taken to the prison, where he will begin a six-year sentence for violating his parole.
