A FERRY STEAMER MAROONED IN ICE

Twenty-five men at Work Below Prescott Trying to Out Passage.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., Feb. 10.—Marooned since yesterday in the north channel of the St. Lawrence River, twenty men, the crew of the ferry Charles Lyon, plying between Ogdensburg and Prescott, awaited resumption of efforts to-day to free the vessel from an ice field just above Rapid a Point. Attempts to release the ferry were abandoned last night, when the hazardous condition of the ice and the darkness made the work difficult. To-day twenty-five men, equipped with saws and ice-cutting tools, were ready to cut a channel through which the vessel might safely pass.

KINGSTON'S BONDS BRING GOOD PRICE

City Sells \$120,000 5 Per Cent. 30-Year Bonds Exceptionally Well.

What is regarded as an exceptionally good sale of city bonds, has just been put through by Kingston's City Treasurer, Oscar V. Bartlett.

The City of Kingston has sold \$120,000 five per cent. thirty-year public school bonds at 109.59, yielding 4.962 per cent. Wood Gundy & Co., being the purchasers.

In connection with the sale of these bonds, it is of interest to note that last week \$2,000,000 4 1/2 per cent. Toronto harbor bonds were sold at 93.25, yielding 4.947. These were discount bonds, which always sell at a little higher price.

The Town of Midland sold its 5 per cent. bonds at 95.55, yielding 5.07 per cent. When all conditions are considered Kingston bonds brought an excellent price, but this has always been the case, as a review of the past records will show. MILITARISM IN SCHOOLS. Toronto West Presbytery Defines Attitude on Matter. Toronto, Feb. 10.—Spirited and exhaustive discussion took place at the meeting of Toronto West Presbytery yesterday over the question of military training in schools. A resolution opposing cadet training and the like, passed by the General Council of the church, was referred back, but after long argument another resolution was passed by a large majority. This resolution set forth that the church could not give its approval to military training in the schools, because of its tendency to create a militaristic outlook in the minds of youths.

Three of Family Burned to Death

At Elmvale, Ont., When Fire Destroyed Their Dwelling and Store.

Elmvale, Feb. 10.—Joseph MacWaters, Mrs. Joseph MacWaters and their son Lawrence MacWaters, the latter aged fifteen were burned to death this morning in a fire which destroyed their store and dwelling, together with three other buildings, and threatened for a time to wipe out a considerable portion of this village. The fire was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Pearson, who occupied the store and dwelling adjoining that of Mr. MacWaters. They were awakened about 3.30 a.m. by the noise of crackling flames and by smoke. They escaped in scanty apparel. The MacWaters building was then a burning mass, and nothing was seen of the unfortunate inmates. The Pearson store and dwelling was quickly destroyed by fire. Wilfred Burs barber shop and James McDermott's insurance office followed. The progress of fire was finally stopped by the brick walls of the Standard Bank on one side and the Central Hotel on the other.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. MacWaters were found in the ruins, search for the body of the boy Lawrence is continuing.
