Testing Valves For Perfect Seating

IT APPEARS that many motorists, who grind their engine valves hemselves are unfamiliar with the methods of verifying the correctness of their work. While it is fairly safe to assume that if, after grinding is completed, both the valve face and the valve seat show corresponding, perfectly continuous and uniform bright rings as contact surfaces, seating will be tight, the following precedure may be resorted to as a further proof of the accuracy of the work. With a soft lead pencil, make a series of marks across the valve face about one-eighth of an inch apart, place the valve in its seat and rotate it back and forth several times thereon, under light pressure, through not more than one-quarter of a complete turn. If the valve is completely rotated, the test is vitiated, as it will indicate perfect seating, if this is by no means the case. Remove the valve and examine the pencil marks. 'If all of them has been obliterated or broken, where they cross the bright ring, a good fit between valve and seat has been demonstrated, but if some of them have not been rubbed, the seating at these points is in doubt and further "touching up" may be needed. The ability of a seated valve to prevent the escape of gasoline is proof of its tightness and valves-in-the-head can be tested by introducing gasoline into the valve port and noting that it is retained. - Caged overhead valves are very readily checked for tightness by using gasoline.

To protect down to eight degrees below zero R the recommended percentages are glycerine 20, alcohol 20 and water 60. As the cooling system of your car holds about 24 pints, a mixture of five pints glycerine, five pints of alcohol and fourteen pints of water will make a solution that will give you protection down to ten degrees below zero. Most hardware stores and many garages can supply you with the unmixed glycerine and alcohol and you can obtain glycerinealcohol mixtures which, when used
