FACILITIES FOR STUDENTS' UNION

Suggestions of the Students Are Being Gathered This Week.

The suggestions of the students as to the facilities to be provided in the proposed Students' Union of Queen's University, are being gathered this week. A questionnaire has been prepared, outlining certain proposals and also asking for suggestions. Included in the questionnaire, which was issued by a students' committee, are the following: Recreative facilities—bowling, card room and billiards; Club Features—lounge, smoking room, wash room and cloak room; Administrative facilities—offices for graduate and undergraduate societies, committee rooms and general administrative offices; Commissariat Department—cafeteria or general restaurant and tea room; Hospitality Facilities—A series of guest rooms for the use of graduates or friends or relatives of undergraduates who may be visiting the University, general and private reception parlors.

WOULD HEAR NOTHING AGAINST BISALLION

Commercial Protective Association President Tells About Telling Bureau.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—Representations made more than a year ago by the Commercial Protective Association to Premier King and other members of the Cabinet concerning smuggling were discussed this morning at the customs probe. R. P. Sparks, president of the association, read letters which he had written to Premier King giving the result of investigations by the association's detectives and asking for drastic measures against smuggling. Mr. Sparks had previously informed Hon. Jacques Bureau, then Minister of Customs, that the association had good reason to believe that J. E. Bisallion, former customs inspector of the port of Montreal, was dishonest and that there could be no effective administration of that port until Bisallion was replaced. Mr. Bureau replied, said Mr. Sparks, that Bisallion was satisfactory to him, and Mr. Bureau would hear nothing against him.
