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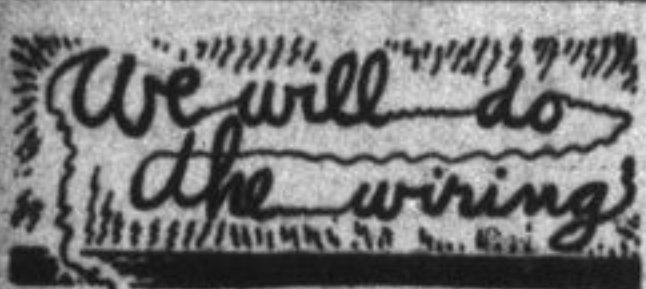

The members of the Fire and Light committee, at their meeting held on Tuesday afternoon, discussed the annual report of Fire Chief Armstrong, a synopsis of which appeared in The Whig a short time ago. Amendments to the rules and regulations of the fire department are now under way, and it is expected that they will be ready for the consideration of the members of the committee at their next meeting, in two weeks' time.

The chairman, Ald. Milne, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Alds. Carson, Martin and J. E. Johnston.

TO SELL MANSE.

The Ontario Church Property Commission has given its decision on the application of St. Andrew's Church, Grattan, Restrow county, for an order apportioning the manse property at Douglas, between the applicants and the congregation of the Zion Church, Douglas. The applicants voted not to enter the United Church and the respondents voted to enter. The respondents have one month in which to pay to the applicants the sum of \$750 in satisfaction of the applicants' interest in the manse property, and the applicants have one month in which to pay to the respondents the sum of \$2,250 in satisfaction of the respondents' interest in the manse property. In default of payment under either of these options, the manse property should be sold by auction.

Sir John Gladstone had sat in the House from 1818 to 1827; but the continuous succession did not begin till 1820. After that came:—1830-1837—Sir Thomas Gladstone (second baronet). 1838-1852—Mr. W. E. Gladstone (brother of second baronet). 1852-1859—Mr. John Nelson Gladstone (brother of W. E.). 1866-1885—Mr. W. H. Gladstone (eldest son of W. E.). 1880-1910—Mr. H. J. Gladstone, subsequently Lord Gladstone (youngest son of W. E.). 1910-1926—Lord Gladstone.
