Fire and Light Committee Go non, Main street. Over Chief's Report and Prepare Budget.

The members of the Fire and Light committee, at their meeting. held on Tuesday afternoon, discussed the annual report of Fire Chief Arm strong, a synopsis of which appeared in The Whig a short time ago. The committee also considered the mates for the year, and, at present the amount fixed to meet the requirements of the department for the year is placed at \$33,456.60, but this does not provide for an increase in salary for the members of the fire department. The question of salary increase for the firemen has yet to be decided upon.

The committee received a communication from the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, submitting a report on the test made by the association's inspector on the local fire department last October. As usual, the association has criticisms to offer regarding the ca-
