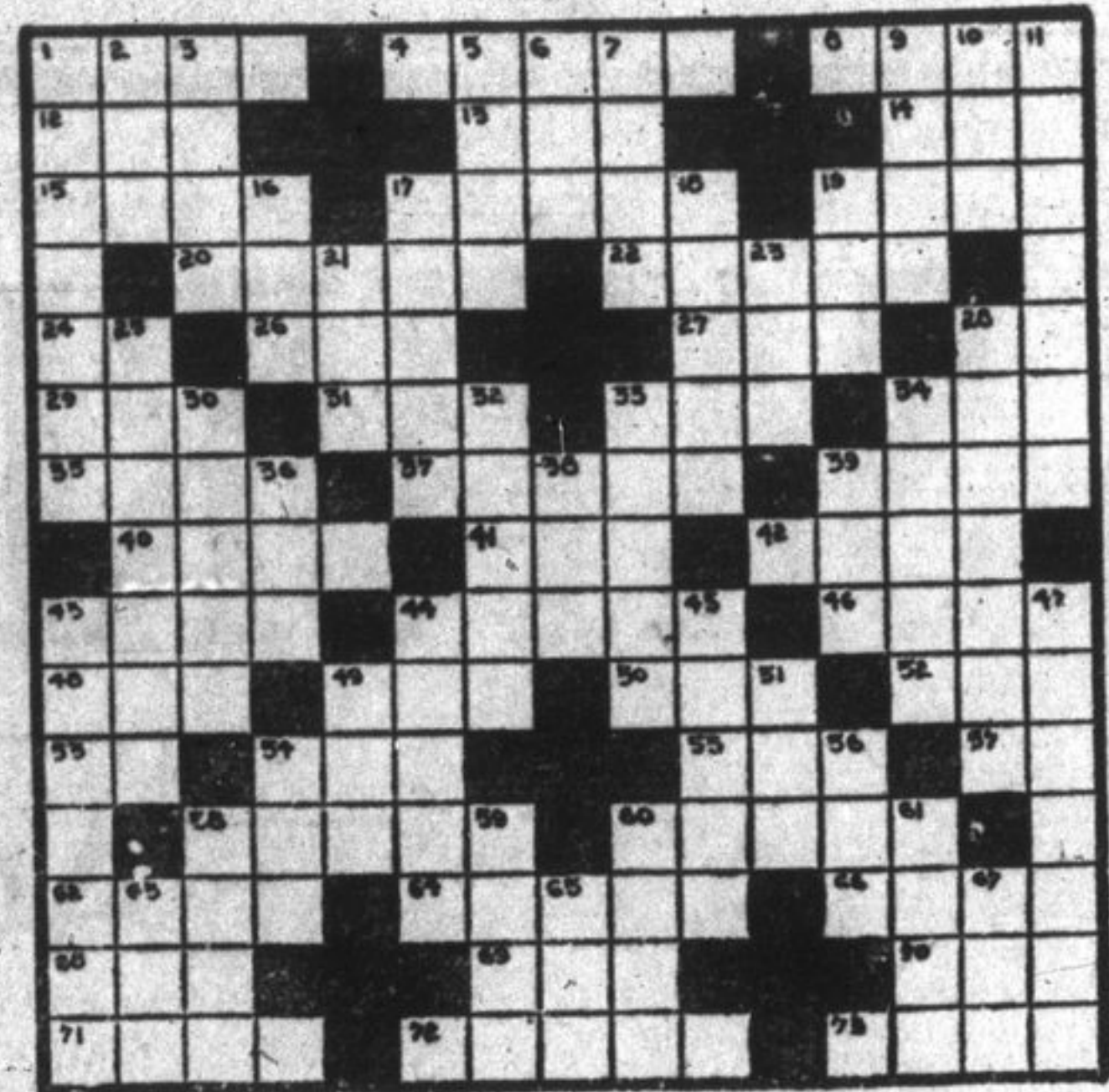

ICE BOAT TRAGEDY OCCURS AT TORONTO

Two Girls Cling to Submerged Craft and Their Rescue Effected.

Toronto, Feb. 18.—Reginald Helton, aged twenty, of 26 Dixon Avenue, Toronto, was drowned last night when the ice boat he was sailing ran into open water on the Bay and submerged. Carl Crockett, aged 19, of 30 Norway Avenue, swam to solid ice and ran more than a mile to summon the life-saving crew, who effected a thrilling rescue of Mabel Hescott, 631 Bathurst street, and Belvie Neehan, aged seventeen, of 9 Norway Avenue. The two girls had been clinging to the waterlogged craft.
