RECITAL AT NOTRE DAME

The pupils of Notre Dame convent and those of the public who were fortunate enough to be present on Friday afternoon, were treated to one of the finest piano recitals heard in this city. Miss Gladys Ewart, the talented Ottawa pianist showed herself in her happiest vein. All through her recital she kept the rapt attention of her audience.

The first number by Bach was well fitted to open this beautiful programme, for here was shown to advantage the intricacies of contrapuntal playing. The first part of the play was devoted to the works of the old Masters—the revival of which is very marked in all musical centres.

Schumann's "Carnaval," 20 scenes, was indeed a marvel. One only had to close the eyes to see the gaiety and enjoyment of the dancers and partakers at the "Carnaval." Pierrot and Pierrette almost seemed to be alive before us on the stage for such was the magic of the pianist's fingers.

"The Lark"—Glinka Balakireff—was a delightful number. We were almost made to forget that we were in a Canadian winter—so sweetly did the lovely Lark sing to us.

Much more could be added—suffice it to say that all those who heard Miss Ewart will long keep in remembrance both her wonderful playing and her pleasing personality. Simplicity was the keynote and the merit of the recital might be judged by the perfect silence and keen attention of every listener in the hall.

MORE SECESSIONS.

From British Liberal Party Over Land Policy.

London, Feb. 20.—Misfortune continues to dog the Liberal party with further secessions of prominent figures announced or reported. Commander Hilton Young, swing to Lloyd George's land policy, has broken loose from the party and henceforth will sit in parliament as an independent member. He has been leader of the right wing Liberals and although he does not intend to join the Conservatives, his loss to the party is serious.

The Liverpool Daily Courier says five other Liberals, who have figured prominently in the party, have signified their desire to join the Conservatives. They are Sir Max Muirhead, Lady Muirhead, Mrs. F. C. Wilson, J. M. Griffiths and Edward West, all members of the Liverpool city council.

Suffers Broken Arm In Auto Accident

While returning home on Friday night from Napanee, Mr. Henry Hoare of Bath met with a serious accident, when a Chevrolet touring car which he was driving slowed over a six foot embankment, and crashed into a telephone pole. Mr. Hoare suffered a fracture of the elbow of his left arm. The car was also badly smashed up, two of the wheels being broken off. The unfortunate man was attended by Dr. Northmore of Bath.

SON IS ARRESTED.

On Charge of Killing His Mother During Quarrel.

Winnipeg, Feb. 20.—Ten hours after the slaying of his mother, Mrs. Katie Kowbel, Wasy Kowbel, aged thirty-four, was arrested early today by the provincial police constable of Emerson, Man. He will be brought to Winnipeg and charged with murder. Mrs. Kowbel was killed at her home near Caliente, Man. The victim of the tragedy was a widow, seventy-two years old. When Wasy refused to go to the bush to get some fire wood, his mother is alleged to have picked up a stick to force him to do her bidding. In a quarrel which ensued, Wasy is alleged to have beaten his mother to death. This weapon was a heavy piece of firewood.

NO DEFINITE WORD.

As To Identity of Man Found Frozen to Death at Winnipeg.

Mrs. Mary Lloyd, of 33 First street, Kingston who has fears that the body found frozen in a refrigerator car in Winnipeg is that of her nephew, Clarence Clark, has received no definite information. In the meantime she is greatly worried, and is awaiting word from the west. When interview on Friday afternoon by the Whig she was moved to tears when speaking of her nephew, who left her two weeks ago. On Friday she notified the local police about the matter and all that can be done is being done to solve the matter.

A DIABOLICAL PLOT.

Unearthed in a Religious Sect at Absecon, N.J.

Atlantic City, N.J., Feb. 20.—Described as the "most diabolical plot" disclosed by the Department of Justice, raids and arrests at three homes of the "Live and Never Die" negro religious sect in Absecon, were conducted by deputy marshals and Department of Justice officers yesterday. Those arrested include seven "elders and sisters" of the cult and six young women, whom agents charge were victims of E. W. Robertson, "Messiah," who had become mothers.

SUZANNE COLLAPSES.

France's Champion Lawn Tennis Girl Confined to Bed.

Nice, France, Feb. 20.—Suzanne Bengien collapsed while enroute to Beaulieu by automobile to-day to fulfill her engagements in the lawn tennis tournament here. She was taken back to her home where she is confined to her bed, and is expected to be scratched from the tournament. She is entered in the doubles.

RIOT IN SHANGHAI JAIL.

Results in the Killing of Five Chinese Prisoners.

London, Feb. 20.—The Daily Mail's Shanghai correspondent says that a riot at the French municipal jail on Thursday in which five Chinese prisoners were killed and eleven wounded during an attempt of 100 men to escape from jail, was the culmination of two years of plotting.

FIRE IN HOTEL

Five Men Missing and Several Are Severely Injured.

East St. Louis, Ill., Feb. 20.—Two men were missing, three others were severely injured and sixty guests were forced to flee in their night clothing when fire early today destroyed a section of the Arnold hotel here, with a loss estimated at \$130,000.

London, Feb. 20.—A. S. M. Hutchinson, the author of "If Winter Comes," and other best sellers, left London for the Continent yesterday with his bride, much surprised that his secret wedding by special license Thursday had become known. His bride was Miss Una Rosamond Britton Gapper. The novelist and his bride had not intended to go on a honeymoon so soon, but started immediately they learned their secret had been discovered.

Death of Phelps Johnson.

Montreal, Feb. 20.—Phelps Johnson, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Dominion Bridge Co. and its former president, died this morning in the Royal Victoria Hospital here. He was born in 1849, coming to Canada from the United States.
