### PROTECTION FALLACY SAYS REGINA MEMBER

Western Canada Not Asking for Any Policy of Protection, He Declares.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—Resuming his speech at the night session, Mr. Ladner charged the Government with weakness and inactivity. "If I was in the position of the ministers opposite, and had a policy to submit to this Parliament and proposed to carry on business, I would take the necessary means to enable me to carry it on," continued Mr. Ladner. "The public is sick and tired of inactivity. There is business to be done, there are problems to be solved."

F. N. Darke, Liberal Regina, followed. "The Lamentations of Jeremiah have nothing on the walling of the Tory out of office, he commented at the opening of his speech. The west was sympathetic towards grievances in the maritime provinces and the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the condition there was the proper course to pursue. The west would like to see its grain shipped through Canadian ports, but he pointed out, it was essential that there should be sufficient shipping at whatever port on this side of the Atlantic the grain was loaded for shipment to the markets of the world. This question of sufficient shipping was one of the difficulties in the way of the development of maritime ports through greater grain shipments.

Mr. Drake termed protection as "a fallacy." Western Canada was not asking for any policy of protection. Stewart McClellan, Conservative of Ottawa, who was the last speaker of the day, held that the country wanted the Conservative party as its government.

Morristown, Pa., Feb. 20.—Three women on a jury trying a boot-legging case held out for "gritty" until the men members of the jury "smoked" them into acquiescence with fumes from cigars, cigarettes and pipes, the district attorney has been informed.

Melton, Newbury, Eng., Feb. 20.—The Prince of Wales is back in the saddle. Undeterred by his recent fall, in which he suffered a fracture of his left collar bone, he joined the members of the Blankney Hunt and followed the hounds to-day.

While last Saturday there were no potatoes to be found on the market, there were several loads selling at \$3.50 per bag this week. The following are the prevailing prices: parsnips, 40c peck; onions, 50c peck; beets, 25c to 40c peck; turnips, 30c peck; cabbage, 5c and 10c; imported cabbage, 25c; rhubarb, 15c bunch; green onions, 10c bunch; oyster plant, 25c quarter peck; flowers, 75c to \$1.00 per pot; pork, hind 25c, front 21c; beef, hind 12c front 9c; veal hind 18c front 15c; mutton hind 20c, front 15c; lamb hind 30c, front 25c.
