### ELEVEN DEATHS ARE CAUSED BY STORM

In the Middle West-Buildings **Destroyed and Streets** Flooded.

Chicago, Feb. 26.-Eleven are dead and scores injured as a result of the high windstorm in the middle West. Winds struck the central part of the country yesterday, accompanied by heavy rains and snow, at a velocity of sixty miles an hour, causing incalculable property loss. Buildings were destroyed, streets flooded, telephone and telegraph lines damaged and traffic delayed. Four white persons and a negro were killed in Chice County Arkansas, but only one death reported although practically the entire town of Tisdale, Mississippi, was demolished.
