## EXPECTING AN EARLY NAVIGATION OPENING

Much Activity Along the Harbor Front—Vessels Are Being Repaired.

There is considerable activity along the harbor front, and the repairs on the steamers are being rushed so that all will be in readiness for the boats to start out in the spring. Kingston has harbored more steamers this season than in many previous years, and the work of repairs has furnished employment to a large number of men. The repairs have not been completed on the majority of the steamers and there will be work for some time to come. The large number of steamers wintering in Kingston will be of great benefit to the marine suppliers and merchants in general. When the steamers start out in the spring all their supplies are purchased from local merchants and the crews for the boats are in the city over a week before the boats sail, which means considerable money to the merchants. An early opening of navigation is expected this year by the marine men.

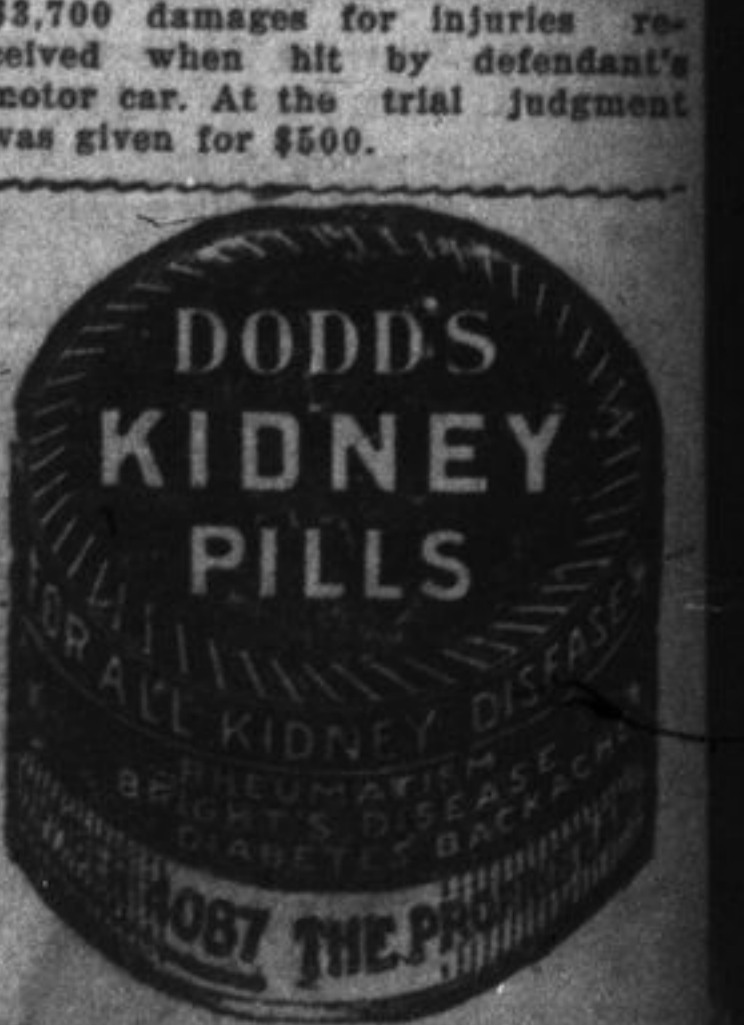

Appeals Dismissed.
