HOW TO PREPARE A TASTY DISH

Cut each pound Fillet into three servings. Prepare a bowl of heavily salted milk—one tablespoonful of Salt to each cup of milk—dip each serving of Fish into the salted milk and toss into a pan of finely sifted, dry, bread crumbs—then into an oiled oven pan. When pan is filled, sprinkle each piece with a little oil or melted fat shaken off a pastry brush. Bake in a VERY-HOT OVEN for ten or fifteen minutes. When properly cooked at high temperature, the pan underneath the fillets will be dry, the fish browned on both sides and the juices of the fillet intact inside. Serve with Sauce Tartar.
